JOURNAL OF THE MEETING OF THE SHEBOYGAN COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

March 21, 2023

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.11, the March 21, 2023 session of the Sheboygan County Board was called to order by Chairperson Vern Koch at 6:00 p.m. Chairperson Koch noted that the notice of meeting was posted on March 17, 2023 at 4:00 p.m. in compliance with the open meeting law. The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance by all present.

The roll call was taken and recorded with 21 Supervisors present; (1) Supervisor attended remotely: Supervisor Jorgensen; Absent: 4, Supervisors Coulson, Ellis, Gruber, and Kulow.

Supervisor Ellis arrived at 6:01 pm.

Resolution No. 32 (2022/23) Re: Honoring the Life of Former County Board Supervisor James P. Glavan.

Pursuant to County Board Rule 2.13, this Resolution was on the floor for immediate action and was unanimously adopted by the Board on a rising vote and a pause in its deliberations.

County Administrator Krause, Chairperson Koch and Vice Chairperson Abler presented a signed copy of the resolution to James Glavan, and Susan Theune.

Supervisor Brauer moved for approval of the February 21, 2023 Journal, which was distributed to all supervisors prior to the meeting. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Wegner and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

LETTERS AND COMMUNICATIONS

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Clark County Board of Supervisors opposing the State's current wind energy regulations. By Chairperson referred to the Planning, Resources, Agriculture, and Extension Committee.

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Columbia County Board of Supervisors requesting revisions to the State's Solar Energy System law. By Chairperson referred to the Planning, Resources, Agriculture, and Extension Committee.

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors requesting State to use a portion of the 2023 budgetary surplus for the maintenance, repair and replacement of county trunk highway systems. By Chairperson referred to the Transportation Committee.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

County Administrator Alayne Krause reported that the Departments annual reports have all been submitted and are being finalized. They will be posted on the Departments respective web pages soon and she encouraged everyone to view them. Ms. Krause reviewed the resolutions and ordinance being voted on including Resolution 28 which was referred back to the Transportation Committee from the Executive Committee for changes to the agreement only; Resolution No. 31 for the generous donation from Ducks Unlimited to purchase a parcel adjacent to the Sheboygan Marsh; Ordinance No. 05 which is amending Chapter 47 to allow for the dispatchers to be put in their own DBM; and Resolution No. 30 for the Opioid settlements which the Committee recommended being adopted as amended. She clarified that the content

of the resolution hadn't changed but was updated to align with the template resolution for Wisconsin counties prepared by the Wisconsin Counties Association.

Supervisor Gruber joined the meeting at 6:12 p.m. remotely.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee regarding Resolution No. 28 (2022/23) Authorizing Elkhart Lake's Road America Right of First Refusal and Option to Purchase recommending adoption.

Supervisor Wegner moved to adopt the resolution. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Goehring and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee regarding Resolution No. 31 (2022/23) Accepting Donation from Ducks Unlimited and Authorizing Purchase of Property to be Added to the Sheboygan County Broughton Marsh recommending adoption.

Supervisor Goehring moved to adopt the resolution. Supervisor Clarke seconded the motion which carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee regarding Ordinance No. 05 (2022/23) Amending Pay Scale for Sheriff's Department Dispatchers recommending enactment.

Supervisor Goehring moved to enact the ordinance. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Brauer and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance Committee regarding Resolution No. 30 (2022/23) Authorizing Sheboygan County to Enter Into the Settlement Agreements with Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Walgreen Co., Walmart, Inc., CVS Health Corporation and CVS Pharmacy, Inc., Agree to the Terms of the Addendum to the MOU Allocating Settlement Proceeds, and Authorize Entry Into the MOU with the Attorney General recommending adopt as amended per the revised red-lined version.

Supervisor Wegner moved to adopt as amended per the revised redlined version of the resolution. Supervisor Brauer seconded the motion which carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Legislature has limited how counties can regulate solar and wind energy
 Systems. See Wis. Stat. § 66.0401.

WHEREAS, The Wisconsin Public Service Commission ("PSC") has promulgated rules that limit how counties can regulate wind energy systems. See PSC 128 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.

WHEREAS, Planning and Zoning is a fundamental regulatory function and authority of Wisconsin counties.

WHEREAS, Clark County residents have expressed concerns about contractual provisions proposed by
 both solar and wind renewable energy companies in renewable energy easement agreements.

WHEREAS, the Clark County Planning, Zoning and Land Information Committee and the Clark County
Board of Supervisors have concerns about the regulatory limitations placed on the counties by PSC 128
and Chapter 66, Wisconsin Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Clark County recommends and requests the Wisconsin
 Public Service Commission and the Wisconsin State Legislature to revise PSC 128 and/or Chapter 66 of
 the Wisconsin Statues to address the following concerns:

- a. Some renewable energy contracts under the current regulations appear to bind owners and their property to decades worth of encumbrances while allowing renewable energy companies to terminate the contracts at any time for any or no reason.
- b. The law does not prohibit energy companies from shifting liability created by the renewable energy company to the landowners. This includes liability for stray voltage, diminished property values, neurological problems, cancer, and death that the renewable energy companies cause.
- c. State Law prohibits the regulation of the density and footprint of renewable energy systems by Municipalities, and prohibits Clark County from requiring bonding certain to ensure proper decommissioning of renewable energy systems.
- d. Clark County has concerns about the use of renewable energy systems and their impact on agricultural land and production, at a time when war abroad disrupts food chains and causes food shortages, and as domestically we are experiencing uncontrolled inflation.

RESOLUTION NO. 14-23

 SYNOPSIS: Request State to Revise Solar Energy System Law INTRODUCED BY: Planning and Zoning Committee

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Columbia County:

 WHEREAS, Wisconsin counties possess limited authority to regulate solar energy systems in their communities as a result of Wisconsin State law; and,

WHEREAS, the regulation of solar energy systems is generally dependent on size, with smaller solar energy systems being subject to within Wis. Stat. § 66.0401(1m), and those above one hundred (100) megawatts the Wisconsin Public Service Commission (PSC);

WHEREAS, while Wis. Stat. § 66.0401(1m) provides a mechanism for counties to consider areas of local concern, it provides little ability for counties to restrict or even deny a project based on local concerns from residents, environmental impact, or economic impact. Within Wis. Stat. § 66.0401(1m), terms like "public health" or "safety" are undefined, a clear evidentiary threshold was never included; and, while found with Wis. Stat. § 59.69, the term "welfare" was not included with the reason for its omission uncertain; and,

WHEREAS, there are currently 14 solar and battery energy storage systems being proposed in the Midcontinent Independent System Operator, Inc. queue as of February 23, 2023 to be constructed within Columbia County, totaling 1220 MW of solar energy generation potential and 1000 MW of battery storage potential; and with many of these developers stating that there will be a phase 2 for their projects, an untold number of acres of prime farmland, wildlife habitat, threatened and endangered species of plants and animals that have been documented within project areas, scenic country views, lives, and livelihoods could be destroyed with little to no opportunity for the County to intervene; and.

WHEREAS, public utilities and private developers are using a loophole in Wis. Stat. § 196.491(3)(d)2 and 3 that exempts wholesale merchant plants from meeting the same standards as public utility companies in order to receive their Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN) and then immediately turn around and sell the project to a public utility company.

WHEREAS, the State has given planning and zoning authority to the County through Wis. Stat. § 59.69, specifically in order to "promote the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare; to encourage planned and orderly land use development; to protect property values and the property tax base" and to "preserve wetlands; to conserve soil, water and forest resources; to protect the beauty and amenities of landscape and man-made developments; to provide healthy surroundings for family life." However, when it comes to utility-scale solar, the County process and authority is completely circumvented.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Columbia County Board of Supervisors hereby requests that the Wisconsin State Legislature revise Wis. Stat. § 66.0401(1m) and Wis. Stat. § 196.491 as follows in order to grant Wisconsin counties the authority to responsibly site utility-scale solar installations in order to maintain orderly planning and comply with the statutory requirement laid out in Wis. Stat. § 66.1001(3) to adhere to the objectives, goals, and policies contained in the County's comprehensive plan:
