#### **September 20, 2016**

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.11, the September 20, 2016 session of the Sheboygan County Board was called to order by Chairperson Thomas Wegner at 6:00 p.m. Chairperson Wegner noted that the notice of meeting was posted on September 16, 2016 at 2:00 p.m. in compliance with the open meeting law. The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance by all present.

The roll call was taken and recorded with 23 Supervisors present; Absent: 2, Supervisors Hilbelink, and Ogea.

Supervisor Winkel moved for approval of the August 16, 2016 Journal, which was distributed to all supervisors prior to the meeting. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Epping and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

#### **APPOINTMENTS**

The Chairperson announced that the next order of business was the consideration of the appointments by the Chairperson of **Richard Bemis and Jack VanDixhorn (Re-appointment)** to the Airport Advisory Committee.

Supervisor Winkel moved to concur with the appointments. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Te Stroete and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Chairperson announced that the next order of business was the consideration of the re-appointment by the County Administrator of **Steven Bauer** to the Airport Advisory Committee.

#### COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

County Administrator Adam Payne recognized Allen Nohl for his leadership and thanked him for the ongoing improvements to Veterans Memorial. Mr. Payne also thanked and acknowledged Court Commissioner Ryan O'Rourke, District Attorney Joe DeCecco, Health and Human Services Director Tom Eggebrecht, Planning and Conservation Director Aaron Brault, and Finance Directory Wendy Charnon for key initiatives they are involved with. Mr. Payne reviewed the status of the 2017 budget development process, the Pennsylvania Avenue house acquisition economic Development opportunity, and the new drug treatment court. Mr. Payne also reviewed the Five-year capital plan and status of the new transportation complex that will consolidate three facilities into one. Mr. Payne encouraged supervisors to attend the state-wide Just Fix-It Transportation Forum that Sheboygan County is hosting on September 29, 2016 at 7:00 pm at the Health and Human Services Department.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee regarding Resolution No. 15 (2016/17) 2017 Five-Year Capital Plan recommending amending the resolution by including the County Clerk's request for \$500,000 for voting equipment in 2017 and as so amended, recommend the resolution be adopted.

Supervisor Weggeman moved to adopt the resolution as amended per the committee report. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Goehring.

Stat. §59.692(1t), no enforcement action shall be commenced against a person who owns a building or structure that is in violation of a Shoreland zoning standard or this Ordinance if the building or structure has been in place for more than ten (10) years and as so amended recommend enactment.

Supervisor Damp moved to enact the ordinance as amended per the committee report. Supervisor Goehring seconded the motion which carried on roll call vote of the board of Ayes: 19; Noes: 4, Supervisors Baumgart, Hoffmann, Procek, and Weggeman; Absent: 2, Supervisors Hilbelink, and Ogea.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance Committee regarding Resolution No. 17 (2016/17) Approving Land Swap at Amsterdam Dunes recommending adoption.

# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 21 (2016/17)

Re: Approving Revisions to Farmland Preservation Plan

WHEREAS, a County Farmland Preservation Agreement is a component part of the County's development plan under Wis. Stat. § 59.69(3), and

WHEREAS, one of the requirements necessary to enable farmland owners to enter into farmland preservation agreements is that the County adopt a Farmland Preservation Plan which is certified by the State as being compliant with Chapter 91 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and

WHEREAS, the Sheboygan County Planning & Conservation Department has developed a Farmland Preservation Plan for Sheboygan County which was adopted by the Sheboygan County Board of Supervisors on November 1, 2005, as Resolution No. 25 (2005/06) and was revised by Resolutions No. 23 (2013/14), No. 19 (2014/15), and No. 15 (2015/16), which Plan and its revisions was certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, and

WHEREAS, the Planning, Resources, Agriculture, and Extension Committee (PRAECom) has determined that the Plan requires revision of certain provisions in light of changes that were made to the Towns of Holland, Lima, and Mosel Zoning Ordinances in order to remain consistent with the County's development plan and remain eligible for state certification;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Sheboygan County Board hereby approves the revisions to the Sheboygan County Farmland Preservation Plan, in the manner reflected in the copy on file in the County Clerk's Office and made a part hereof by reference hereto and makes it a part of Sheboygan County's Development Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning & Conservation Director and Corporation Counsel be directed to undertake such further action as necessary to confirm the certification of the Plan.

# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 23 (2016/17)

Re: Authorizing Relocation of Highway Offices and Facilities

WHEREAS, through the adoption of Resolution No. 6 (2015/16) the County Board authorized the purchase of vacant land in the Town of Plymouth for the development of a comprehensive highway facility and the consolidation of the Plymouth shed and the Elkhart Lake shed, and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Director and Transportation Committee have hired an architectural consultant for the purpose of developing plans for a new facility, and

WHEREAS, the development of the comprehensive highway facility would not only be prudent from the perspective of replacement and consolidation of the Plymouth and Elkhart Lake sheds but would also serve as an appropriate location for a centralized Department headquarters in place of the headquarters currently located at North 23rd Street in the City of Sheboygan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board approves the construction and development of a comprehensive highway facility in the Town of Plymouth to serve as the headquarters of the Transportation Department and to serve as the shed for highway operations currently being administered out of the Plymouth, Elkhart Lake, and North 23rd Street facilities, to be financed out of the sale of the existing sites and as otherwise provided in the Five-year Capital Plan and including use of the Fund Balance.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Administrator and the Transportation Director shall continue to take such steps as may be necessary to dispose of the current shed sites, including the North 23rd Street site, subject to approval of the Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Administrator and the Transportation Director shall coordinate the relocation of the current Highway operations from the Elkhart Lake, Plymouth, and North 23rd Street facilities into the new facilities when they are completed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the design of the new facility, it is expected that the County Administrator, the Transportation Director, and the Transportation Committee shall incorporate such environmentally-friendly and energy-efficient materials and systems as is practical.

Resolution No. 23 (2016/17) Re: Authorizing Relocation of Highway Offices and Facilities

This resolution is to authorize the relocation of Highway Department offices and facilities and construction of a comprehensive highway facility in the Town of Plymouth to serve as headquarters for the Transportation Department. The land in the Town of Plymouth was purchased through adoption of Resolution No. 6 (2015/16) which also provided the authority to begin the process of disposing the property in preparation of the consolidation of the Elkhart Lake Shed with the Plymouth Shed Facility. This resolution also authorizes sale and disposal of the property on North 23<sup>rd</sup> Street and requires the new facility incorporate such environmentally-friendly and energy-efficient material and systems as practical.

#### **Funding:**

If approved the anticipated funding for the new comprehensive highway facility will be \$15,000,000 in borrowing, sale proceeds of the Elkhart Lake Shed appraised at \$500,000, the Plymouth Shed appraised at \$570,000, the North Street Facility appraised at \$1,100,000 and use of \$5,350,000 Fund Balance, as well as, State of WI reimbursement of \$560,000, and \$1,800,000 of borrowed funds taken in 2016; all spread over the project timeline which from inception to completion is projected to last approximately two and one half years.

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# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 24 (2016/17)

Re: Supporting "Just Fix It" for Statewide Road Maintenance

WHEREAS, local governments in Wisconsin are responsible for about 90% of the road miles in the state, and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's diverse economy is dependent upon county and town roads as well as city and village streets and transit systems across the state, and

WHEREAS, according to Filling Potholes: A New Look at Funding Local Transportation in Wisconsin commissioned by the Local Government Institute of Wisconsin (LGI), the condition of Wisconsin's highways now ranks in the bottom third of the country, and

WHEREAS, the failure of state funding for local roads in Wisconsin to keep up with costs over the past several decades has adversely affected local transportation finances, and, according to *Filling Potholes*, municipal transportation spending has declined from \$275 per capita in 2000 to \$227 in 2012, and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's over-reliance on borrowing eats away at the state's segregated funding sources – the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees – which increasingly pay debt service rather than fund transportation needs, and

WHEREAS, although safety is a primary concern and responsibility of local governments across Wisconsin, according to TRIP, a national non-profit transportation research group, Wisconsin had 347 non-interstate, rural road fatalities in 2013, and

WHEREAS, although our state highway and interstate system is the backbone of our surface transportation system and plays a vital role in the economy of Wisconsin, both local and state roads need to be properly maintained in order for our economy to grow, and

WHEREAS, from a competitive standpoint, Wisconsin motorists pay significantly less than any of our neighbors when the annual cost of the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees are combined, and

WHEREAS, the Transportation, Finance, and Policy Commission appointed by the Governor and Legislature found that if Wisconsin does not adjust its user fees, the condition of both our state and local roads will deteriorate significantly over the next decade, and

WHEREAS, the Sheboygan County Board has made the hard choice to implement a County sales tax to support local transportation, and now it is time for the State of Wisconsin to make similar hard choices;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Sheboygan County Board of Supervisors urges the Governor and Legislature to "Just Fix It" and to agree upon a sustainable solution — one that includes a responsible level of bonding and adjusts our user fees to adequately and sustainably fund all of Wisconsin's transportation systems including a targeted fund increase for local units of government.

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**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the County Clerk is directed to forward copies of this Resolution to the Governor, Sheboygan County legislative delegation, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and such other public officials as the Chairperson of the Transportation Committee may deem appropriate.

# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 18 (2016/17)

Re: Authorizing County to Lend Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission \$72,608.63 to Refinance Pension Liability

WHEREAS, Sheboygan County receives valuable benefits through its participation and membership in the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission, and

WHEREAS, Sheboygan County probably benefits more from the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission than any of the other seven counties in the region since the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission also serves as the Sheboygan Metropolitan Planning Organization, and

WHEREAS, as have other local units of government, the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission faces challenges arising out of the unfunded actuarial accrual liability to the Wisconsin Retirement System, and

WHEREAS, the current liability as of June 27, 2016, is \$72,608.63 and is currently subject to interest at the state rate of 7.20%, and

WHEREAS, unlike Sheboygan County, which refinanced its similarly unfunded liability, the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission is unable to refinance its liability to get at a more manageable rate, and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of Sheboygan County and the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission for Sheboygan County to lend the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission an amount not to exceed \$72,608.63 and to take back a promissory note from the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission under the terms of three percent (3%) interest over a term of ten (10) years as is authorized by Wis. Stat. § 66.009(13);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County, through the County Administrator, is authorized to lend to Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission an amount not to exceed \$72,608.63 based on the terms and conditions as set forth above so that the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission can pay off its unfunded pension liability to the Wisconsin Retirement System.

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# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 19 (2016/17)

Re: Approving Standard Intergovernmental Agreement for County Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing

WHEREAS, when Sheboygan County enacted Ordinance No. 2 (2016/17), Enacting One-half Percent County Sales Tax to Maintain Sheboygan County's Transportation Infrastructure, a unique feature of the Ordinance was that it provided that a portion of the revenue received from the Ordinance would be made available to local units of government within Sheboygan County to assist those municipalities in addressing their own transportation needs, and

WHEREAS, Section 7.07 of the Sales Tax Ordinance provided that the distribution to local units of government would be premised upon the municipalities agreeing to be bound by the terms of a standard intergovernmental cooperative agreement, and

WHEREAS, Section 7.07(1) of the Code provided that the terms of the intergovernmental agreement were to be reviewed and approved annually by the County Board, and

2. PURPOSE. Sheboygan County enacted Ordinance No. 2 (2016/17) establishing a one-half percent (.5%) County sales tax for the purpose of raising revenues to address the challenges of maintaining Sheboygan County's roads and bridges. In enacting the Ordinance, the County Board recognized that the municipalities within Sheboygan County have similar financing challenges for the transportation infrastructures within those municipalities. The Ordinance requires that \$1.5 Million of anticipated revenues (adjusted annually) from the sales tax be distributed to municipalities within County based on a equalized value formula provided that the municipalities agree to be bound by the terms of an Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement as approved by the County Board. This Agreement, having been approved by the County Board, and agreed to by Municipality, assures that the revenue being distributed herein will be spent to maintain Municipality's road and bridge infrastructure.

#### 3. EFFECTIVE DATE; TERM; TERMINATION.

- A. Effective Date. This Agreement shall become effective on the last date of the required signatures at the end of this document.
- **B. Initial Term; Renewals.** The initial term of this Agreement is for calendar year 2017 and is subject to renewal.
- C. Termination By County. During the term, this Agreement may be terminated by County, if County determines that Municipality is not honoring the terms and conditions of this Agreement and County shall have no further obligations to make any payments or perform any other requirements herein.
- **D.** Termination By Municipality. During the term, this Agreement may be terminated by Municipality if Municipality determines that it no longer wishes to be bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement and County shall be relieved of any further obligations to make any payments or perform any other requirements herein.
- 4. AUTHORITY. This Agreement is entered into between the parties pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0301, authorizing intergovernmental cooperation and by Wis. Stat. § 77.76(3) which allows counties to distribute sales tax proceeds to municipalities within Sheboygan County. Both parties represent that their respective governing bodies have authorized entry into this Agreement.

#### 5. RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNTY.

- A. County shall, over the course of calendar year 2017, pay to Municipality as a distribution of sales tax revenue, the sum of \$\_\_\_\_\_.
- B. County shall determine at its option whether the payment will be distributed in one lump sum or whether it will be in periodic payments. County shall determine at its option the timing and method of the payments.
- C. County shall provide reasonable advance notice to Municipality as to its payment distribution method so that Municipality may budget accordingly.

#### 6. RESPONSIBILITIES OF MUNICIPALITY.

- A. Municipality agrees to use the payment for road and bridge maintenance purposes.
- B. Municipality agrees not to reduce its road and bridge maintenance budget as a result of receiving the payment. It is the intent that the payment shall enhance Municipality's ability to address its road and bridge maintenance needs over the amount that Municipality would otherwise be budgeting for this purpose.
- C. Municipality may, as part of its budgeting and planning process, hold over spending all or part of the payment into a different calendar year or otherwise bundle the payment in a manner that is acceptable in advance with the County provided the County is satisfied that Muncipality's spending of the payment is consistent with the intent that the payment shall enhance Municipality's ability to address its road and bridge maintenance needs over the amount that Municipality would otherwise be budgeting for this purpose
- D. Municipality agrees to cooperate with County's Finance Department to allow County to review Municipality's budget, resulting financial reports and supporting detail to assure County that Municipality is complying as provided herein.
- E. Municipality must provide a Resolution supporting the County Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing Cooperative Agreement.
- 7. RESOLUTION OF DISPUTES. County, through its County Administrator, shall determine as to whether Municipality has fulfilled its responsibilities under this Agreement. This Agreement will be renewed annually upon similar terms.
- 8. HOLD HARMLESS; INDEMNIFICATION. Each party shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the other against any and all claims, liabilities, damages, judgments, causes of action, costs, loss, and expense including reasonable attorneys' fees imposed upon or incurred by the other party arising from or related to the negligent or intentionally tortuous acts or omissions of the indemnifying party's officers, employees, or agents in performing the services pursuant to the Agreement. Each party shall promptly notify the other of any claim arising under this provision, and each party

shall fully cooperate with the other in the investigation, resolution, and defense of such claim. This Agreement does not waive any governmental or sovereign immunity. Both parties retain all applicable governmental immunities, defenses, and statutory limitations available, including Wis. Stat. § 893.80, 895.52, and 345.05.

- 9. SEVERABILITY. If any provision in this Agreement is determined to be void and unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect unless the removal of the severed provision would substantially impair the ability of either party to perform the essential purpose of this Agreement.
- 10. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties relating to their relationship and supersedes all prior understandings, oral agreements, negotiations, representations, and agreements relating to the same subject matter.

#### Members of the County Board:

Section 2.12(5) of the County Code requires the Human Resources Committee to prepare an annual report in advance of each October County Board meeting summarizing the actual cost of employee health insurance claims, imputing the claim experience into a monthly rate for various category groups, and recommending rates into the future for single and family groups.

This report and the recommendations were required as part of the necessary administration of the County's self-insurance program. Through the adoption of Resolution No. 21 (2015/16), the County Board determined that it was in the County's best interests to pool its self-insurance program with other counties through the Wisconsin Counties Association Group Health Trust. As a result, Group Health Trust now assumes responsibility to assist the County with establishing the annual cost of health insurance. Therefore, this correspondence shall fulfill the Human Resources Committee Annual Report of Health Insurance obligation.

Sheboygan County is nearing its first full year of participation in the Group Health Trust. To date, the Group Health Trust has proven to be a positive partnership with the Human Resources Department, in addition to providing excellent services to all employees. As a result of the County Board decision to work Group Health Trust, Sheboygan County saved approximately \$1,000,000 in 2016 in maintaining our health insurance reserves. The Group Health Trust renewal increase for 2017 is 4%, which is below the industry standard. However, the proposed 2017 budget includes a 5% increase, which based on our recent claim history is prudent and allows Sheboygan County to maintain healthy insurance reserves. This increase will also allow Sheboygan County to continue our focus on wellness initiatives going forward.

# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 07 (2016/17)

Re: Creating Property Assessed Clean Energy Financing (PACE) Ordinance

WHEREAS, the County Board adopted Resolution No. 13 (2016/17) on August 16, 2016, which authorized Sheboygan County to become a member of a Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Commission in order to provide real property owners, lessees, lenders, and other financial parties in Sheboygan County with access to a uniformly-administered program to provide PACE financing as authorized by Wis. Stat. § 60.0627(8), and

WHEREAS, in order to implement the authority provided in Resolution No. 13 (2016/17), it is necessary for Sheboygan County to enact an enabling Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Sheboygan does ordain as follows:

Section 1. <u>Creating PACE Ordinance</u>. Chapter 8 of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances is hereby created as follows:

# Chapter 8 PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY (PACE) FINANCING

- 8.01 PURPOSE. Sheboygan County finds that renovations or additions to premises located in the County made to improve energy efficiency, improve water efficiency, and/or use renewable resource applications, increase property values, stimulate local economic activity, provide local and global environmental benefits, and promote the general welfare of County residents. The purpose of this Ordinance is to facilitate loans arranged by property owners or lessees to make such improvements by treating loan principal and interest, fees, and other charges as special charges eligible for inclusion on the tax roll for these properties.
- 8.02 DEFINITIONS. In this Chapter:
  - (1) Annual installment means the portion of the PACE loan that is due and payable for a particular year under the supplemental agreement.
  - (2) **Borrower** means the property owner or lessee of the subject property that borrows the proceeds on a PACE loan.
  - (3) **Default loan balance** means the outstanding balance, whether or not due, of a PACE loan at the time that the County receives foreclosure proceeds.
  - (4) **Foreclosure proceeds** mean the proceeds received by the County from the disposition of a subject property through an *in rem* property tax foreclosure.
  - (5) Loan amount means the principal, interest, administrative fees (including the Program Administrator's fees) and other loan charges to be paid by the borrower under the PACE loan.
  - (6) PACE means Property Assessed Clean Energy.

#### (7) PACE default provisions means:

- (a) The delinquent annual installment(s) due when the County initiates the *in rem* property tax foreclosure on the subject property;
- (b) Any additional annual installment(s) that become due between the time that the County initiates in rem property tax foreclosure on the subject property and the date the County receives the foreclosure proceeds.
- (c) Any default interest charges applied to unpaid annual installments referenced in Subsections (a) and (b), above, as provided in the supplemental agreement; and
- (d) Any default loan balance.
- (8) PACE lender means any person that makes a PACE loan and which may include an affiliate of the borrower.
- (9) PACE loan means a loan made by a PACE lender to a borrower under this Section for energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications made to or installed on a subject property.
- (10) **Person** means any individual, association, firm, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, trust, joint venture, or other legal entity or a political subdivision as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627.
- (11) **Program Administrator** means the person retained by the Wisconsin PACE Commission as provided in Section 8.05(2).
- (12) Subject property means any premises located in the County on which an energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications are being or have been made and financed through an outstanding PACE loan.
- (13) Supplemental agreement means a written agreement among a borrower, a PACE lender, and the County as provided for in Section 8.07.
- (14) Wisconsin PACE Commission means the Wisconsin PACE Commission formed under Wis. Stat. § 66.0301, as may be amended, by the County and one or more other political subdivisions as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 pursuant to a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement relating to the Wisconsin PACE Commission as provided hereafter.
- 8.03 STATUTORY AUTHORITY. This Section is enacted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as may be amended which authorizes a county to make a loan or enter into an agreement regarding loan repayments to a third party for owner-arranged or lessee-arranged financing to an owner or a lessee of a premises located in the

county for making or installing an energy efficiency improvement, a water efficiency improvement, or a renewable resource application to a premises..

8.04 PACE LOANS AS SPECIAL CHARGES; DELINQUENT AMOUNTS AS LIENS. Any PACE loan made and secured pursuant to this Chapter shall be considered a special charge on the subject property. Any installment or portion of a PACE loan made and secured pursuant to this Chapter that becomes delinquent according to the terms of the PACE loan shall be a lien against the subject property and placed on the tax roll as permitted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as may be amended.

#### 8.05 WISCONSIN PACE COMMISSION.

- (1) In the event a Wisconsin PACE Commission is formed and Sheboygan County becomes originator of such PACE Commission and any Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement thereunder, any of the powers and duties of the County under this Chapter, except for those under Section 8.09, may (but are not required to) be delegated to the Wisconsin PACE Commission.
- (2) The Wisconsin PACE Commission shall further be authorized to retain a Program Administrator to act as its agent and administer the PACE program, subject to adherence with PACE program requirements consistent with this Chapter and Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as may be amended.

#### 8.06 LOAN APPROVAL.

- (1) A prospective borrower applying for a PACE loan shall comply with the loan application process set forth in the program manual approved by the County.
- (2) The County shall approve the financing arrangements between a borrower and PACE lender.

#### 8.07 SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT.

- (1) The County, the borrower, and the PACE lender shall execute the supplemental agreement which, without limitation:
  - (a) Shall inform the participants that the PACE loan amount shall, if requested by the Program Administrator, be imposed as and considered a special charge, and any year's annual installment, if delinquent, may be included on the property tax roll of the subject property as a special charge and an annual installment that is delinquent shall be a lien against the subject property pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.027 as may be amended;
  - (b) Shall recite the amount and the term of the PACE loan;
  - (c) Shall provide for the amount or a method for determining the amount of the annual installment due each year;
  - (d) Shall provide whether default interest shall be applied to unpaid annual installments;

- (e) Shall require the PACE lender and the borrower to comply with all federal, state, and local lending and disclosure requirements;
- (f) Shall provide for any fees payable to the County and/or Program Administrator:
- (g) Shall recite that the supplemental agreement is a covenant that runs with the land:
- (h) May provide for prepayments of annual installments by the borrower with a resulting reduction in the special charge for the prepayment, subject to any prepayment premium charged by the PACE lender, if any; and
- (i) May allow for amendment by the parties.
- (2) Prior to executing the supplemental agreement, the owner of the subject property, if different from the borrower, and any existing mortgage holder(s) on the subject property must have executed a separate writing acknowledging the borrower's use of PACE financing for the subject property and the special charge that will be imposed under this Chapter and its consequences, including the remedies for collecting the special charge.
- (3) Each PACE loan shall be amortized over the term of the PACE loan as provided in the supplemental agreement.
- (4) The annual payments of a PACE loan may be payable in installments as authorized by Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as may be amended.
- 8.08 ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS ADDED TO TAX ROLLS. Upon the request of the Program Administrator, the County shall place any year's annual installment, if delinquent, on the tax roll for the subject property as permitted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627 as may be amended.
- 8.09 REMITTANCE OF SPECIAL CHARGES. The County shall promptly remit to the Wisconsin PACE Commission any payment(s) it receives with respect to any special charge imposed under this Section including penalties and charges thereon it may receive from any taxing district or the County Treasurer pursuant to Wis. Stat. Ch. 74, as amended, subject to the County retaining any agreed-upon portion thereof for its own costs and expenses attributable to administering the PACE loan and its collection.
- 8.10 PROPERTY TAX FORECLOSURE PROCEDURES.
  - (1) If a subject property owner fails to pay any special charges imposed on the subject property under this Section as required, the county may proceed in collecting the special charge pursuant to Chapter 91 of this Code.
