The Clerk presented a resolution from the St. Croix County Board of Supervisors urging the Governor and Legislature to agree upon sustainable funding for Wisconsin's transportation system. By Chairperson referred to the Transportation Committee.

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Polk County Board of Supervisors authorizing a request to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue for a waiver from state mandated process concerning Act 261 (2015) and absentee ballots. By Chairperson referred to the Finance Committee.

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors regarding Act 261 (2015) dealing with absentee ballots. By Chairperson referred to the Finance Committee.

The Clerk presented a resolution from the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors regarding Act 261 (2015) dealing with election night returns. By Chairperson referred to the Finance Committee.

The Clerk noted on the supervisors desks is a copy of the County's Comprehensive Annual Finance Report which will be presented by Schenck & Associates at the August 16, 2016 County Board meeting.

### **COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT**

County Administrator Adam Payne thanked and acknowledged all law enforcement officials, emergency responders and dispatchers for their bravery and public service. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the victims and their families in Dallas and Baton Rouge and those involved in the recent drowning's at the South Pier. Mr. Payne also addressed the County's Transportation Proposal and thanked staff for their role in gathering information, and the Transportation, Finance and Executive Committees' for their essential input and support. Mr. Payne also thanked the Heads of Local Government and the Sheboygan County Economic Development Corporation for their support.

During County Administrator Payne's report, Supervisor Uraynar called a point of order on the grounds that the content of the report was outside of the scope of the agenda description. Chairperson Wegner denied her point. Supervisor Uraynar then appealed his decision but did not receive a second and Mr. Payne finished his report.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee regarding Resolution No. 10 (2016/17) Approving Easement for Sheboygan Water Utility at Esslingen Park recommending adoption.

Supervisor Goehring moved to adopt the resolution. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Winkel and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Clerk read the report of the Joint Executive/Finance Committees regarding Ordinance No. 02 (2016/17) Enacting One-half Percent County Sales Tax to Maintain Sheboygan County's Transportation Infrastructure recommending amending as follows:

New Section 7.10 to be created as follows:

7.10 SEVEN-YEAR REVIEW. After January 1, 2024, at which time the sales and use tax will have been in place for seven (7) years, the County Administrator, together with the Finance Director and the Transportation Director, shall prepare a report to the County Board as to the amount of revenue received through the tax since its inception, the amount of debt service reduction realized since its inception, the impact that the tax revenue has had on the stated goal to maintain the County transportation system, the projected future transportation infrastructure needs after 2024, and such other aspects as may be deemed relevant. The report shall contain a recommendation as to whether this Chapter shall be continued and be presented to the County Board no later than June 1, 2024, so that the Board may act on the report's recommendations as it determines may be appropriate for implementation prior to the enactment of the budget for 2025.

The current Sections 7.10 and 7.11 are renumbered to 7.11 and 7.12.

And as so amended recommend the ordinance be enacted.

Supervisor Koch moved to enact the ordinance as amended per the committee report. Supervisor Te Stroete seconded the motion.

Supervisor Otten moved to amend the ordinance as follows: Lines 137 through 147 are amended to read as follows:

(2) The balance shall be assigned as revenue to the Transportation Department Highway Division in its annual budgets, for its use for repair and reconstruction of roads and bridges maintaining and improving its transportation-system and capital equipment.

7.08 HIGHWAY CAPITAL BORROWING. In consideration of receiving the sales and use tax revenues, no annual budget of the Transportation Department Highway Division shall include bonding capital projects or capital equipment related to road and bridge repairs, maintenance, or road and bridge reconstruction unless authorized by the County Board.

The motion was seconded by Supervisor Epping and was defeated on roll call vote of the board of Ayes: 2, Supervisors Bauer, and Otten; Noes: 23.

Ordinance No. 02 was enacted as amended on roll call vote of the board of Ayes: 18; Noes: 7, Supervisors Bauer, Damp, Hilbelink, Marthenze, Ogea, Otten, and Uraynar.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance Committee regarding Resolution No. 07 (2016/17) Approving Sale of .68-acre Parcel from Taylor Park Complex to Adjacent Property Owners recommending adoption.

**Supervisor Glavan moved to adopt the resolution.** The motion was seconded by Supervisor Winkel and carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance Committee regarding Resolution No. 08 (2016/17) Authorizing Purchase of Properties at 616, 618, and 622 Pennsylvania Avenue, Sheboygan recommending adoption.

**Supervisor Winkel moved to adopt the resolution.** Supervisor Damp seconded the motion which carried on roll call vote of the board of Ayes: 22; Noes: 3, Supervisors Hoffmann, Otten, and Uraynar.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance Committee regarding Resolution No. 09 (2016/17) Authorizing Sale of Elkhart Lake Shed Property recommending adoption.

Supervisor Winkel moved to adopt the resolution. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Glavan and carried on roll call vote of the board of Ayes: 21; Noes: 4, Supervisors Bauer, Baumgart, Otten, and Uraynar.

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# Resolution No. 32 (2016) RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT "JUST FIX IT" FOR STATEWIDE ROAD MAINTENANCE

1 2	WHEREAS, local government in Wisconsin is responsible for about 90% of the road miles in the state; and
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5	WHEREAS, Wisconsin's diverse economy is dependent upon county and town roads as well as city and village streets and transit systems across the state; and
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7	WHEREAS, according to "Filling Potholes: A New Look at Funding Local
8	Transportation in Wisconsin," commissioned by the Local Government Institute of Wisconsin
9	(LGI) the condition of Wisconsin's highways is now in the bottom third of the country; and
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11	WHEREAS, state funding for local roads in Wisconsin has failed to keep up with costs
12	over the past several decades which has adversely affected local transportation finances.
13	According to "Filling Potholes," municipal transportation spending has declined from \$275 per
14	capita in 2000 to \$227 in 2012; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, Mass Transit Operating Aids and County Elderly and Disabled
17	Transportation assistance programs are funded through the state gas tax and vehicle registration
18	user fee systems. These programs are critical to ensuring that transportation services are
19	delivered to vulnerable citizens. Proper funding for these programs helps ensure that all citizens
20	have an opportunity to access the workplace as well as the marketplace; and

22	WHEREAS, levy limits do not allow local governments to make up for the deterioration
23	of state funding; and
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25	WHEREAS, Wisconsin's over-reliance on borrowing eats away at the state's segregated
26	funding sources - the state gas tax and vehicle registration fees - which increasingly pay debt
27	service rather than fund transportation needs; and
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29	WHEREAS, safety is a primary concern and responsibility of local governments across
30	Wisconsin. Unfortunately, according to TRIP, a national non-profit transportation research
31	group, Wisconsin had 347 non-interstate, rural road fatalities in 2013; and

33	WHEREAS, the St. Croix County Board of Supervisors recognizes that our state highway
34	and interstate system is the backbone of our surface transportation system and plays a vital role
35	in the economy of Wisconsin. Both local and state roads need to be properly maintained in order
36	for our economy to grow; and
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38	WHEREAS, from a competitive standpoint Wisconsin motorists pay significantly less
39	than any of our neighbors when you combine the annual cost of the state gas tax and vehicle

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50 51 52 Governor and Legislature clearly found that if Wisconsin does not adjust its user fees, the condition of both our state and local roads will deteriorate significantly over the next decade. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the St. Croix County Board of

Supervisors urges the Governor and Legislature to "Just Fix It" and to agree upon a sustainable solution: one that includes a responsible level of bonding and adjusts our user fees to adequately and sustainably fund all of Wisconsin's transportation system, including a targeted fund increase for local units of Government. Furthermore, the St. Croix County Board of Supervisors directs the Clerk to send a copy of this resolution to our State Legislators, Governor Scott Walker, Wisconsin Counties Association and the State of Wisconsin County Clerks.

WHEREAS the newly created mandate imposes unrealistic time constraints upon the County Clerk in processing absentee ballots in that during the April 2016 election one quarter of the 1100 absentee ballots were processed within statutory time constraints and absentee ballots for the general election to be held in November 2016 are likely to increase three fold.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that, pursuant to Wisconsin Statute Section 66.0143, the Polk County Board of Supervisors does hereby authorize on behalf of Polk County a request to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue for a waiver from the state mandated process concerning absentee as set forth in Wisconsin Statute Sections 6.35(5)(a)2., 6.36 (1)(a) 13., and 14.

### BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Clerk is directed to, as follows:

- 1. Prepare and Submit to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue the application for local appeals for exemption from state mandate as authorized herein.
- Distribute a copy of this resolution to the Wisconsin Government Accountability Board, Wisconsin county clerks, the Wisconsin Legislators representing constituents residing in Polk County, the Wisconsin County Clerks Association, the Wisconsin Municipal Clerks Association, Wisconsin Towns Association, League of Wisconsin Municipalities, and Wisconsin Counties Association.

### RESOLUTION NO.: 14-2016-17

### TO THE HONORABLE, THE OUTAGAMIE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

### LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

**MAJORITY** 

2015 Act 261 (2015 Senate Bill 295) was enacted March 16, 2016, and published March 17, 2016. 2015 Act 261 made changes to include electronic voter registration, verification of registrations, proof of residence for voting, electronic poll lists, election equipment approval, counting of absentee ballots, and other elections and campaign finance items. 2015 Act requires additional categories of information in the official registration list (WisVote System), which largely relate to absentee voting activity.

Under the Act, the official registration list must have separate columns indicating each of the following: (1) the date on which a voter applied to vote by in-person absentee ballot; (2) the date on which the clerk mailed an absentee ballot to a voter; (3) the date on which a voter returned the absentee ballot; (4) the polling location associated with each voter's address and ward or aldermanic district, if any; and (5) the mailing address for the municipal clerk associated with the polling location identified for a voter.

The Act also requires clerks to input the required absentee voting information into the official registration list within a specified period of time. A clerk must enter or submit to the clerk's designee the information identified in (1), (2), and (3) above, as well as other required information about the voter, within 48 hours after mailing the absentee ballot, receiving the in-person absentee ballot application, or receiving the returned absentee ballot. If the information is submitted by the clerk to a designee, the clerk's designee must enter the information within 24 hours after receiving it from the clerk. If the deadline falls on a Saturday or Sunday, then the deadline is extended to the next business day.

The Outagamie County Clerk is a provider of WisVote System services for 19 municipalities within Outagamie County. WisVote Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the 19 municipalities was approved for the 2016-2017 election cycle by Resolution No. 108—2015-2016. The WisVote MOUs were signed by all 19 municipalities. As part of the WisVote MOUs for services, the agreements state the following: "This Memorandum of Understanding will not require the County Clerk to track the absentee voting process through SVRS/WisVote, in the event such is required by the State of Wisconsin."

With the enactment of 2015 Act 261, immediately prior to the April 5, 2016, election, the Wisconsin Government Accountability Board (GAB) urged providers of WisVote services to enable fulfillment of the absentee tracking service for the April 5, 2016, despite that MOUs might not require the service for those municipalities (reliers).

The Outagamie County Clerk met with administration, reporting anticipated county clerk labor costs, difficulties with enablement of timely communication between provider/reliers, relier clerk issues with enablement of WisVote training/self-provision of absentee tracking in the compressed timeframe, issues relative to relier broadband/internet service, relier hardware/software challenges, and relier issues with

staff for the 19 municipalities.

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Outagamie County municipal clerks, who provide their own WisVote services within their municipalities, were surveyed by the Outagamie County Clerk about the challenges with Act 261 absentee tracking with the fall partisan elections, most notably the November 8, 2016, General Election, when voter turnout will be closer to 100% of registered voters and absentee voters will be approximately five times what was experienced in the April 5, 2016 election. The survey respondents reported staffing challenges faced by provider clerks with other required deadlines.

staffing. From the meeting, a decision was reached to comply with GAB's request to

enter in absentee data into WisVote for the April 5, 2016, election. However, the timing

deadline of 24 hour data entry from receipt of relier absentee information was not met

approximately 30% of the time in entering in the data by the Outagamie County Clerk's

The Outagamie County Clerk reported estimated costs associated with providing WisVote absentee tracking services for the remaining 2016 elections for the 19 reliers. The estimate is approximately \$12,000 to enable sufficient labor to meet the 24 hour data entry requirement for a providing entity to enter absentee activity within WisVote. The estimate may not be sufficient and feasibility to provide deadline required service for the November 8, 2016, is being reported by the Outagamie County Clerk.

Previous to the required tracking of absentee information in WisVote, clerks not utilizing WisVote, were required to keep a paper log of the absentee voter request, when the absentee ballot was mailed to the absentee voter, and when the ballot was received from the absentee voter by the municipal clerk. Additionally, clerks were required to make notations on the poll lists of voters who were mailed an absentee ballot. The required data entry of absentee ballot information into WisVote enables some efficiency with the data being entered prior to the printing of poll books and enables efficiency with reconciling voter participation. However, the deadlines required in the new legislation do not allow for batching information, are especially problematic for rural municipalities with no sufficient internet/broadband service, and requires additional labor for all municipal clerks to ensure compliance with the law.

This resolution supports repealing 2015 Act 261 requirement that absentee voter/ballot tracking activity be entered into WisVote within a certain time frame. The WisVote absentee ballot tracking deadline, for both provider and relier clerks, is not feasible with current staffing and in some municipalities with infrastructure (no reliable broadband/internet service), will cost all election administration entities additional labor/funding, and requires an additional election deadline during a timeframe when other election activity is vitally more important for elections.

NOW THEREFORE, the undersigned members of the Finance Committee and Legislative/Audit and Human Resources Committee recommend adoption of the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors does support the repealing of Wisconsin Statutes 6.33(5)(a) 2. language that reads, "no later than 48 hours after mailing an absentee

## RESOLUTION NO.: 15-2016-17

**MAJORITY** 

2015 Act 261 (2015 Senate Bill 295) was enacted March 16, 2016, and published March 17, 2016. 2015 Act 261 made changes to include electronic voter registration, verification of registrations, proof of residence for voting, electronic poll lists, election equipment approval, counting of absentee ballots, and other elections and campaign finance items. 2015 Act 261 requires that "on election night the [county] clerk shall post all returns, by ward or reporting unit, on an Internet site maintained by the county no later than 2 hours after receiving the returns." The Wisconsin Statutes had previously required county clerks to post all returns, but the new provision has raised questions regarding the interpretation of "all returns."

Outagamie County is one of several counties whose election night returns are called in from the election inspectors/clerks. Outagamie County election equipment throughout the county, except for the Village of Wrightstown, is not capable of moderning in unofficial election returns, which would enable returns of all races/referenda being counted to be reported. Outagamie County utilizes the Planning Department's staff and the Esri GIS program to report election night returns, which enables written reports and individual maps for each contest race/referenda. If "all returns" is interpreted as "all" school and municipal contests/local referenda, staffing requirements for both the county clerk's office on election night and Planning Department labor to enter in additional municipal/school contests/referenda will in some cases double the requirements. The costs would especially be larger in the Spring elections when municipal and school races normally occur.

Reporting school/municipal races within one county does not provide sufficient data for the determination of unofficial results. Numerous school districts and municipalities cross county lines in Outagamie County and other counties across Wisconsin. Finally, municipal and school official results are determined by those entities' canvasses, not via the county canvass. Therefore, reporting unofficial results will not provide results of the final outcome of those contests/referenda.

This resolution supports the definition of the election night returns to be reported at the county level to include county unofficial election returns relative to those races/referenda that the county canvass will review.

NOW THEREFORE, the undersigned members of the Finance Committee and Legislative/Audit and Human Resources Committee recommend adoption of the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors does support definition in Wisconsin Statutes of reporting election night returns at the county level to include only county unofficial election returns relative to those races/referenda that the county canvass will review, and
