Approving Standard Intergovernmental Agreement for 2026 County Re: Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing

> WHEREAS, when Sheboygan County enacted Ordinance No. 2 (2016/17), Enacting One-half Percent County Sales Tax to Maintain Sheboygan County's Transportation Infrastructure, a unique feature of the Ordinance was that it provided that a portion of the revenue received from the Ordinance would be made available to local units of government within Sheboygan County to assist those municipalities in addressing their own transportation needs, and

> WHEREAS, Section 7.07 of the Sales Tax Ordinance provided that the distribution to local units of government would be premised upon the municipalities agreeing to be bound by the terms of a standard intergovernmental cooperative agreement, and

> WHEREAS, Section 7.07(1) of the Code provided that the terms of the intergovernmental agreement were to be reviewed and approved annually by the County Board, and

> WHEREAS, by the adoption of Resolution No. 19 (2016/17), the County Board approved the form of a standard intergovernmental agreement; and

> WHEREAS, in the inaugural year of the sales tax revenue sharing, the agreement was accepted by all municipalities and the revenue-sharing has been working satisfactorily under the terms of the standard form that was adopted; and

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WHEREAS, the proposed Sheboygan County Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing for Transportation Infrastructure Maintenance 2026 Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, a copy of which is on file with the County Clerk, contains terms and provisions consistent with the goals of the County Sales Tax Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Sheboygan County Board approves the form of the Sheboygan County Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing for Transportation Infrastructure Maintenance 2026 Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement, a copy of which is on file with the County Clerk, and authorizes and directs the County Administrator and County Board Chairperson to execute such agreements with each Sheboygan County municipality willing to be bound by the terms of the Agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Administrator and County Board Chairperson are empowered to agree to any minor modifications to the Standard Agreement that may be requested by a particular municipality that may be necessary to accommodate the municipality's individual circumstances, provided the modifications do not, in the opinion of the County Administrator and County Board Chairperson, contain terms and provisions that are

inconsistent with the goals of Chapter 7 of the Sheboygan County Code, the County Sales and Use Tax Ordinance No. 2 (2016/17), Enacting One-half Percent County Sales Tax to Maintain Sheboygan County's Transportation Infrastructure.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY SALES TAX REVENUE-SHARING FOR TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE 2026 INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

1.	PARTIES. The parties to the Agreement are the
	(Municipality), a municipal corporation with offices at
	, and
SHEBOYGAN	COUNTY (County), a Wisconsin governmental body corporate, organized
pursuant to V	Vis. Stat. § 59.01, having its principal offices at 508 New York Avenue
	Visconsin 53081.

2. PURPOSE. Sheboygan County enacted Ordinance No. 2 (2016/17) establishing a one-half percent (.5%) County sales tax for the purpose of raising revenues to address the challenges of maintaining Sheboygan County's roads and bridges. In enacting the Ordinance, the County Board recognized that the municipalities within Sheboygan County have similar financing challenges for the transportation infrastructures within those municipalities. The Ordinance requires that \$1.5 Million of anticipated revenues (adjusted annually) from the sales tax be distributed to municipalities within County based on an equalized value formula provided that the municipalities agree to be bound by the terms of an Intergovernmental Cooperative Agreement as approved by the County Board. This Agreement, having been approved by the County Board, and agreed to by Municipality, assures that the revenue being distributed herein will be spent to maintain Municipality's road and bridge infrastructure.

3. EFFECTIVE DATE; TERM; TERMINATION.

- A. Effective Date. This Agreement shall become effective on the last date of the required signatures at the end of this document.
 - **B.** Term. The term of this Agreement is for calendar year 2026.
- C. Termination By County. During the term, this Agreement may be terminated by County, if County determines that Municipality is not honoring the terms and conditions of this Agreement and County shall have no further obligations to make any payments or perform any other requirements herein.
- D. Termination By Municipality. During the term, this Agreement may be terminated by Municipality if Municipality determines that it no longer wishes to be bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement and County shall be relieved of any further obligations to make any payments or perform any other requirements herein.
- **4. AUTHORITY**. This Agreement is entered into between the parties pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0301, authorizing intergovernmental cooperation and by Wis. Stat. § 77.76(3) which allows counties to distribute sales tax proceeds to municipalities within Sheboygan County. Both parties represent that their respective governing bodies have authorized entry into this Agreement.

5. RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNTY.

A.	County	shall,	over	the	course	of	calendar	year	2026,	pay	to
Municipality as	a distrib	oution (of sale	es ta	x revenu	e, t	he sum of	\$			<u>_</u> .

- B. County shall determine at its option whether the payment will be distributed in one lump sum or whether it will be in periodic payments. County shall determine at its option the timing and method of the payments.
- C. County shall provide reasonable advance notice to Municipality as to its payment distribution method so that Municipality may budget accordingly.

6. RESPONSIBILITIES OF MUNICIPALITY.

- A. Municipality agrees to use the payment for road and bridge maintenance purposes.
- B. Municipality agrees not to reduce its road and bridge maintenance budget as a result of receiving the payment. It is the intent that the payment shall enhance Municipality's ability to address its road and bridge maintenance needs over the amount that Municipality would otherwise be budgeting for this purpose.
- C. Municipality may, as part of its budgeting and planning process, hold over spending all or part of the payment into a different calendar year or otherwise bundle the payment in a manner that is acceptable in advance with the County provided the County is satisfied that Municipality's spending of the payment is consistent with the intent that the payment shall enhance Municipality's ability to address its road and bridge maintenance needs over the amount that Municipality would otherwise be budgeting for this purpose
- D. Municipality agrees to cooperate with County's Finance Department to allow County to review Municipality's budget, resulting financial reports, and supporting detail to assure County that Municipality is complying as provided herein.
- E. Municipality must provide a Resolution supporting the County Sales Tax Revenue-Sharing Cooperative Agreement.
- 7. RESOLUTION OF DISPUTES. County, through its County Administrator, shall determine as to whether Municipality has fulfilled its responsibilities under this Agreement. This Agreement will be renewed annually upon similar terms.
- 8. HOLD HARMLESS; INDEMNIFICATION. Each party shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the other against any and all claims, liabilities, damages, judgments, causes of action, costs, loss, and expense including reasonable attorneys' fees imposed upon or incurred by the other party arising from or related to the negligent or intentionally tortious acts or omissions of the indemnifying party's officers, employees, or agents in performing the services pursuant to the Agreement. Each party shall promptly notify the other of any claim arising under this provision, and each party shall fully

cooperate with the other in the investigation, resolution, and defense of such claim. This Agreement does not waive any governmental or sovereign immunity. Both parties retain all applicable governmental immunities, defenses, and statutory limitations available, including Wis. Stat. § 893.80, 895.52, and 345.05.

- **9. SEVERABILITY**. If any provision in this Agreement is determined to be void and unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect unless the removal of the severed provision would substantially impair the ability of either party to perform the essential purpose of this Agreement.
- 10. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties relating to their relationship and supersedes all prior understandings, oral agreements, negotiations, representations, and agreements relating to the same subject matter.

WHEREAS, the Law Committee has reviewed County Code Chapter 96 regarding Medical Examiner fees and has determined an update to the code language is appropriate to incorporate the procedure for requesting reimbursement of indigent funeral expenses;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Sheboygan does ordain as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Amending Code</u>. Chapter 96 of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows (only those Sections or portions of Sections affected appear-additions indicated by shading, deletions by strike out):
- 96.10 CERTIFICATIONS OF DEATH. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§ 59.36 and 69.18(2)(d)3, except for a medical certification for the cause of death of an indigent and as provided under Section 96.15 of this Code, the fee charged by the Medical Examiner for providing a medical certification of death shall be as established and amended by the Law Committee.
- 96.11 CREMATION PERMITS. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§ 59.36, and 979.10, except as provided under Section 96.15 of this Code, the fee charged by the Medical Examiner for each cremation permit issued shall be as established and amended by the Law Committee.
- 96.15 FUNERAL AND CEMETARY AID. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §49.785(1r), no fee shall be charged to the recipient of payment under Wis. Stat. §49.785(1). The recipient of such payment shall submit the Notice of Decision approving payment to the Medical Examiner no later than six (6) months from the date of decision.

Section 2. Effective Date. The herein Ordinance shall take effect upon enactment.



SHEBOYGAN COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. <u>08</u> (2025/26)

Re: Delegating the Authority to Enter into Settlement Agreements with Opioid Defendants to the Sheboygan County Administrator and Corporation Counsel

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors previously authorized the County to enter into an engagement agreement with von Briesen & Roper, s.c., Crueger Dickinson LLC and Simmons Hanly Conroy LLP (the "Law Firms") to pursue litigation against certain manufacturers, distributors, and retailers of opioid pharmaceuticals (the "Opioid Defendants") in an effort to hold the Opioid Defendants financially responsible for the County's vast expenditure of money and resources to combat the opioid epidemic;

WHEREAS, on behalf of the County, the Law Firms filed a lawsuit against the Opioid Defendants;

WHEREAS, the Law Firms filed similar lawsuits on behalf of 66 other Wisconsin counties and all Wisconsin cases were coordinated with thousands of other lawsuits filed against the same or substantially similar parties as the Opioid Defendants in the Northern District of Ohio, captioned *In re: Opioid Litigation*, MDL 2804 (the "Litigation");

WHEREAS, four (4) additional Wisconsin counties (Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth) hired separate counsel and joined the Litigation;

WHEREAS, since the inception of the Litigation, the Law Firms have coordinated with counsel from around the country (including counsel for Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth Counties) to prepare the County's case for trial and engage in extensive settlement discussions with the Opioid Defendants;

WHEREAS, 2021 Wisconsin Act 57 created Section 165.12 of the Wisconsin Statutes relating to the settlement of all or part of the Litigation;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance is required to approve settlement agreement between the County and Opioid Defendants;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the proceeds from any settlement of all or part of the Litigation are distributed 70% to local governments in Wisconsin that are parties to the Litigation and 30% to the State;

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(7) bars claims from any Wisconsin local government against the Opioid Defendants filed after June 1, 2021;

WHEREAS, several of the Opioid Defendants previously agreed to settlement terms with the Plaintiffs' Executive Committee ("PEC"), which is comprised of attorneys representative of all litigating local governments around the country, subject to individual approval of the litigating local governments including Sheboygan County;

WHEREAS, representatives of the Law Firms serve on the PEC and, therefore, are intimately familiar with the terms of the previous settlements and will be familiar with the terms of any settlement with any other Opioid Defendant recommended for approval by the PEC;

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that several additional settlements will be proposed by various Opioid Defendants and recommended for approval by the PEC;

WHEREAS, Sheboygan County's process for approving settlement with an Opioid Defendant is typically a process requiring weeks for committee review and approval as well as approval by the full Sheboygan County Board;

WHEREAS, given concerns surrounding timing for participation in future settlements combined with the number of anticipated settlements, it would be prudent to provide an opportunity for Sheboygan County to create a process whereby the authority to enter into settlement agreements is delegated to a responsible County officer or officers provided that any such settlement agreement is recommended by the PEC and the Law Firms; and

WHEREAS, the intent of this Resolution is to delegate to the specified County officer or officers the authority to enter into settlement agreements with any Opioid Defendant from the date of this Resolution forward provided (a) the settlement is recommended for approval by the PEC and the Law Firms; and (b) the Sheboygan County share of proceeds from any such settlement is consistent with the shares established in Exhibit A to Addendum Two, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution and which is consistent with the allocations established in previous settlements with Opioid Defendants.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: the County Board of Supervisors hereby makes the following resolutions:

- 1. The County Board hereby delegates authority to the County Administrator or Corporation Counsel to enter into a settlement agreement, including without limitation the execution of any and all ancillary documents and agreements necessary to effectuate a settlement, with any Opioid Defendant provided (a) the PEC and the Law Firms shall have recommended the settlement; and (b) the Sheboygan County share of proceeds from any such settlement is consistent with the shares established in Exhibit A to Addendum Two, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution and which is consistent with the allocations established in previous settlements with Opioid Defendants.
- 2. Prior to executing any settlement agreement, or any document related thereto, the Corporation Counsel shall provide notice to the County Administrator of the proposed settlement and the terms related thereto.
- 3. The County Administrator is authorized and directed to take any and all such other and further action necessary to effectuate the intent of this Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: all proceeds from any settlement agreement not otherwise directed to the Attorney Fees Account shall be deposited in the County's Opioid Abatement Account. The Opioid Abatement Account shall be administered consistent with the terms of this Resolution, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4), and the applicable settlement agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: the County hereby authorizes the establishment of an account separate and distinct from any account containing funds allocated or allocable to the County which shall be referred to by the County as the "Attorney Fees Account." An escrow agent shall deposit a sum equal to up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the County's proceeds from a settlement agreement into the Attorney Fees Account unless such other amount is established by the applicable settlement agreement. If the payments to the County are not enough to fully fund the Attorney Fees Account as provided herein because such payments are made over time, the Attorney Fees Account shall be funded by placing up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the proceeds from a settlement agreement attributable to Local Governments (as that term is defined in the MOU) into the Attorney Fees Account for each payment. Funds in the Attorney Fees Account shall be utilized to pay the fees, costs, and disbursements owed to the Law Firms pursuant to the engagement agreement between the County and the Law Firms provided, however, the Law Firms shall receive no more than that to which they are entitled under their fee contract when considering the amounts paid the Law Firms from any fee fund established in a settlement agreement and allocable to the County. The Law Firms may make application for payment from the Attorney Fees Account at any time and the County shall cooperate with the Law Firms in executing any documents necessary for the escrow agent to make payments out of the Attorney Fees Account.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that all actions heretofore taken by the Board of Supervisors and other appropriate public officers and agents of the County with respect to the matters contemplated under this Resolution are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

RE: 2026 Five Year Capital Plan

Attached are Resolution No. 9 (2025/26) and the summary for the 2026 Five Year Capital Plan. This plan, after careful consideration, was approved for introduction by the Finance Committee on August 13, 2025.

The 2026 projects under consideration include the Marsh Storage Building for Planning and Conservation. Projects for Building Services include Jail and Detention Center equipment replacement and remodeling, County-wide door access control replacement, elevator upgrades, office LED light replacement, Law Enforcement Center squad garage and sally port floor replacement, Law Enforcement Center Evidence Room remodel, and remodeling at Health & Human Services. Radio equipment upgrades and public safety radio tower site erection for the Sheriff's department. At Rocky Knoll, Pneumatic control replacement and door access controls. Replace immutable backup storage target and network access layer refresh for Information Technology. For Transportation, replace and repair perimeter fencing, runway 4-22 reconstruction, above ground fuel farm compliance updates, maintenance and terminal building generators, Lake Breeze Aviation backup generators and South Side Highway shed building improvements.

For 2026, capital projects total \$11,905,000, and the offsetting reimbursements total \$7,426,200. The total proposed bonding is \$4,478,800. Reimbursements include Information Technology net position, Highway net position, Rocky Knoll net position, Lake Breeze Aviation net position, and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) approved projects.

Our next planned borrowing will be in 2025 or 2026 for the capital projects in 2025 and 2026 with an anticipated aggregate bonding of \$14,787,403. During 2024 our existing general obligation debt was decreased by \$6 million, resulting in an ending general obligation debt at the end of the year of \$23.9 million. Our existing general obligation debt will decrease by \$5.6 million during the fiscal year of 2025.

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Code Section 7.08, in consideration of receiving the sales and use tax revenues, no annual budget of the Transportation Department shall include bonding capital projects or capital equipment related to road and bridge repairs, maintenance, or road and bridge reconstruction unless authorized by the County Board, and

WHEREAS, the attached Exhibit A is the proposed Five-Year Capital Plan of the Finance Committee, which includes bonding capital projects for the Transportation Department at the Courthouse and Rocky Knoll related to the Parking Lot reconstruction;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the attached Exhibit A be adopted as the Five-Year Capital Plan for Sheboygan County and that pursuant to Section 5.06(9)(b)(6) of the County Code of Ordinances, that portion of the Five-Year Capital Plan as adopted by the Board at its September meeting which identifies the capital projects approved for the upcoming budget year shall constitute the capital projects portion of the full budget for 2026.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board specifically authorizes the Finance Department to include in the 2026 Five-year Capital Plan bonding for the Transportation Department related to the Parking Lot reconstruction of the Courthouse and Rocky Knoll.
