- A \$325 review fee, made payable to the Sheboygan County Treasurer if paid by check

Submitting additional supporting information is very important. The applicant, not the Committee, has the burden of proof regarding any claims, statements, or allegations provided in the application. For example, if the applicant claims there is a restrictive covenant on the property, a copy of that easement agreement should be included with the application. Or, if the applicant claims that he or she has received Town approval, documentation evidencing such should be provided.

Physical limitations include lot size, lot shape, topography, steep slopes, or wetlands, among others. They are characteristic not shared by your neighbors' properties, and are not self-created.
How would strict compliance with the Subdivision Ordinance result in unnecessary hardship?
This exists when there is an inability to adhere to the Subdivision Ordinance because of special conditions that would preven you from using your property for its intended purpose. Also, special conditions that would make it unnecessarily burdensom for you to comply with the Ordinance are considered.

However, the same section within the Ordinance states, "Where the Committee, pursuant to Section 71.13 "Variances and Appeals," approves access to any lot by a private road, lane, or drive, the said way shall have a minimum right-of-way access of fifty (50) feet and shall be continuous to a public street or acceptable private street." Lots 1 and 2 of the Certified Survey Map already have in place a 50-foot private easement (Doc. No. 2172520) that is continuous to a public street, Deer Run Lane. The easement meets the required minimum width, as indicated on the CSM, and effectively grants access for current and future owners for both lots.

#### C. Alternatives

- 1. Approve the request for the variance for the proposed land division contingent upon the applicant receiving official approval from the Town of Rhine, completing a soil test for Lot 2, and having a maintenance inspection for the septic system on Lot 1.
- 2. Deny the variance request.

#### D. Recommendation

Per Chapter 71, County Code of Ordinances to grant a variance from this Ordinance, an applicant must convincingly demonstrate that:

- (a) literal enforcement of the provisions of the Ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship on the applicant;
- (b) the hardship is due to special conditions unique to the property; and
- (c) it is not contrary to the public interest.

Should the Committee determine it is appropriate to approve the variance request, Department staff recommends that the Committee incorporate the following conditions into the approval (along with any additional conditions that the Committee deems appropriate):

1. The following language must be placed on the face of the map: "The land divider and future assignees who acquire ownership of these land parcels hold Sheboygan County and the Town of Rhine harmless for problems of access to and from the public road and the building sites."

#### A. Background

Property Owner: Timothy Allman

N7972 Deer Run Lane Elkhart Lake WI 53020

Property Location: Part of SW 1/4 of the NW 1/4, Section 28, Town of Rhine

The applicant, Mr. Tim Allman, is requesting the review and approval of a variance from section 71.22(2)(a) of the Sheboygan County Subdivision Ordinance (Chapter 71, County Code of Ordinances), which regulates land divisions within the unincorporated areas of Sheboygan County. Such land divisions, which can take several forms, are also subject to the requirements of Wis. Stat. Ch. 236.


Mr. Allman has submitted a Certified Survey Map (CSM) to divide their 7.6 acre parcel into two separate lots. Both of these lots would be accessed via a 50-foot-wide easement (Doc. No. 2172520) that currently exists. This easement extends to Deer Run Lane which is a public road.

#### B. Analysis

As shown on the CSM, Lots 1 & 2 would not be in compliance with the Subdivision Ordinance per; sec. 71.22(2)(a) which states, "Each lot within the subdivision or land division shall have a minimum of sixty-six feet of frontage on a public street." These proposed lots would not be in compliance because in their current state, the lots do not have frontage on a public street.





#### **Needs Assessment**

- Through conducting community based environmental scans, key themes emerged related to the needs and priorities of individuals, families, and communities.
  - Common challenges include increasing caregiver stress, financial insecurity, and the need for accessible mental health resources.
  - Opportunities exist to strengthen community support networks, enhance financial literacy education, and provide research-based programming to improve family well-being.

These insights will guide targeted outreach and educational efforts to promote resilience and improve overall quality of life in the community.

#### **Completed Projects**

#### Planning AHEAD

 A 7-session research-based program that helps participants understand how to prepare for the end of life for themselves or a loved one, and why it's important to have a plan in place

#### Powerful Tools for Caregivers

 A six-session class designed to provide family caregivers with the skills they need to take care of themselves. Two versions available with caregivers of adults with chronic conditions and classes for parents of children with special needs.

#### **Upcoming Projects**

- Planning AHEAD: 2 new series planned for January and February
- Powerful Tools for Caregivers: 2 new series planned for February and March
- WeCope: An evidence-based program that helps adult cope with life stress. Participants develop a toolkit of self-care and coping skills centered around gratitude, self-compassion, everyday mindfulness, labeling feelings and goal setting.
- StrongBodies: Continued partnership with ADRC; expansion to Hmong StrongBodies at the Hmong Center to increase equity in aging-friendly fitness programs.
- Caregiver Chats Launch (February): Co-developed series providing monthly, low-barrier education and conversation for unpaid caregivers.
- Tech Talks for Older Adults: Workshops focused on digital literacy, fraud prevention, online safety, and staying connected.
- Bilingual workshops for Hispanic families and youth: Supporting healthy family communication, resilience, and school engagement.

#### Re: Approving Revisions to Farmland Preservation Plan

**WHEREAS**, a County Farmland Preservation Agreement is a component part of the County's development plan under Wis. Stat. § 59.69(3); and

**WHEREAS**, one of the requirements necessary to enable farmland owners to enter into farmland preservation agreements is that the County adopt a Farmland Preservation Plan which is certified by the State as being compliant with Chapter 91 of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

**WHEREAS**, the Sheboygan County Planning & Conservation Department has developed a Farmland Preservation Plan for Sheboygan County which was last adopted by the Sheboygan County Board of Supervisors on January 16, 2024 as Resolution No. 21 (2023/24), which Plan was certified and certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture; and

**WHEREAS**, the Planning, Resources, Agriculture, and Extension Committee (PRAECom) has determined that the Plan requires revision of certain provisions in light of changes that were made to the Town of Herman's Zoning Ordinance and/or Comprehensive Plan in order to remain consistent with the County's development plan and remain eligible for state certification; and

**WHEREAS**, the Planning, Resources, Agriculture, and Extension Committee (PRAECom) has determined that the Plan requires revision of certain provisions in light of changes that were made to the Town of Plymouth's Zoning Ordinance with the creation of the Town of Plymouth Agricultural Enterprise Area (AEA) and the County Boards' subsequent action on September 16, 2025 approving such AEA though Resolution No. 10 (2025/2026).

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Sheboygan County Board hereby approves the revisions to the Sheboygan County Farmland Preservation Plan, in the manner reflected in the copy on file in the County Clerk's Office and made a part hereof by reference hereto and makes it a part of Sheboygan County's Development Plan.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Planning & Conservation Director and Corporation Counsel be directed to undertake such further action as necessary to confirm the certification of the Plan.

#### **Planning & Conservation Department**

#### **Compensatory Time Policy**

#### 1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to clearly outline expectations regarding work hours, overtime avoidance, compensatory time (comp time), and related approval processes for non-exempt employees in the Planning and Conservation Department. This policy ensures compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) while supporting effective workload management and operational efficiency.

#### 2. Standard Workweek Expectation

The standard work week for the Planning and Conservation Department is **Sunday through Saturday**. Employees are expected to manage their schedules to **primarily maintain a 40-hour work week**. Planning ahead and adjusting time worked within the same pay week is critical to minimizing overtime and supporting effective work–life balance.

#### 3. Flexing Time Within the Same Pay Week (1:1 Ratio)

#### 3.1 Flexing Time After Working a Longer-Than-Normal Day

If an employee works longer than normal earlier in the week, they are expected to **flex their schedule later in the same pay week** to return their total hours to 40. Examples include:

- Coming in later for an approved reason
- Leaving earlier for an approved reason
- A night meeting

Flex time is applied at a **1:1 ratio**. For example, if an employee works **one hour longer** on Monday, they should reduce their schedule by **one hour** on another day of the same pay week.

#### 3.2 Proactively Flexing Time for Anticipated Longer Days

If an employee anticipates needing to work a longer day later in the week, they should **proactively manage their time earlier in the week** to offset the additional hours and prevent overtime.

#### 3.3 Requirement to Flex Within the Same Pay Week

All flexing of time must occur within the same Sunday–Saturday pay week. Flexing hours across multiple weeks is not permitted.

#### 4. Overtime and Comp Time

#### 4.1 Approval Requirement

All overtime must be approved in advance by:

- The Planning and Conservation Director, or
- In the Director's absence, the County Conservationist

If advance approval is not practicable due to urgent operational needs, the employee must notify the Director **as soon as practicable**, and no later than the **start of their next scheduled shift**.

Additional requirements:

 Employees must not work beyond their scheduled hours unless they have prior approval from the Director (or County Conservationist in the Director's absence) whenever practicable.

#### 4.2 Overtime Compensation

If an employee works more than 40 hours in a pay week and these hours cannot be flexed within that same pay week, the employee will receive either:

- Overtime pay at 1.5× their regular hourly rate, or
- Compensatory time at 1.5 hours for each hour worked beyond 40.

The method of compensation (pay or comp time) will follow County policy and departmental practices.

## 5. Kohler Center for Marsh Education – On-Call Compensation

#### 5.1 On-Call Status

Employees assigned on-call duty for Kohler Center for Marsh Education rentals will receive:

• 2 hours of comp time, added to their comp time bank, even if they are not called in.

#### 5.2 Call-In Compensation

If the employee is called in while on call, they will earn:

- Comp time or overtime at 1.5× for the hours spent on duty, in addition to
- the 2 hours of comp time earned for being on call.

#### 6. Use of Comp Time

Employees are strongly encouraged to use banked comp time before using other benefit time. such as:

- Vacation
- Sick time
- Personal time (if applicable)

Comp time usage must be scheduled consistent with departmental staffing needs and supervisory approval procedures.

#### 7. Comp Time Payouts

#### 7.1 End-of-Year Payout

Any unused comp time remaining at the end of the calendar year will be **paid out on the first payroll check of the following year**.

#### 7.2 Payout Upon Termination

Accrued but unused comp time will be **paid out on the employee's final paycheck** upon separation.

#### 7.3 Transition to Exempt Status

If an employee transitions from a **non-exempt** to an **exempt** position, all accumulated comp time will be **paid out** at their current rate of pay prior to the transition.

#### 8. Responsibility for Compliance

Employees are responsible for:

- Accurately tracking and reporting hours worked
- Managing schedules to avoid unnecessary overtime
- Seeking advance approval when overtime is anticipated
- Communicating proactively regarding workload and schedule adjustments

Supervisors and department leadership are responsible for ensuring compliance with this policy and approving overtime only when operationally necessary.
