## COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

County Administrator Adam Payne recognized Mr. Allen Nohl for his leadership coordinating the Sheboygan County Veteran's Memorial 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary held recently. Mr. Payne reviewed the Sheboygan County 2015 proposed budget that was distributed which represents a modest property tax levy increase of 1.22% associated with net new construction, and a 0.71% increase, or four cents, in the tax rate. The additional revenue will help the County maintain and improve essential services such as law enforcement, health and human services and our transportation system. Mr. Payne complimented everyone involved with the budget development process and the impressive collaboration among County Board Supervisors, Department Heads and staff.

#### **RESOLUTION #09-14**

## SUPPORTING STATE FUNDING FOR COUNTY 911 SERVICES/ONE DESIGNATED PUBLIC SERVICE ANSWERING POINT PER COUNTY.

WHEREAS 911 emergency dispatch services are among the most vital services that counties provide and Wisconsin residents expect the same level of excellent service throughout the state, regardless of where their emergency occurs; and,

WHEREAS the state of Wisconsin in 2003 established a fee on all wireless phones to fund grants to counties to pay for enhanced 911 services, such as wireless call locating software and equipment; and,

WHEREAS in 2009, the enhanced 911 grant program expired and, in its place, the Wisconsin Counties Association and the state's telecommunications providers advocated establishing a permanent grant program to fund equipment purchases and training for employees of county-designated Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs), each county to designate one PSAP per county by resolution, to be funded with a monthly fee of up to 75-cents on all devices capable of dialing 911; and,

WHEREAS, instead of funding grants to county Public Safety Answering Points the Wisconsin Legislature and the Governor in 2009 redirected the funding and established the 75-cent monthly Police and Fire Protection Fee for all such devices and directed the revenue from the fee to fund the county and municipal aid (shared revenue) account to meet other state financial obligations; and,

WHEREAS without the intended state funding counties must rely almost entirely on property taxes to pay for equipment, training, and consolidation of municipal and county 911 services with many counties unable to upgrade needed equipment to receive texts, video, and still photographs, to provide needed training to 911 system operators, and to foster further consolidation of services; and,

WHEREAS eliminating the Police and Fire Protection Fee and restoring the funding for 911 without replacing the lost revenue would result in a roughly \$50 million annual reduction in shared revenue payments to municipalities and counties; and,

WHEREAS under current law each county must individually contract with a telecommunications provider for telephone lines running into each county 911 center and counties must depend on a maximum 40-cent monthly fee on only landline telephones to pay telecommunications providers for the cost of this service; and,

WHEREAS revenues from the 40 cent landline fee are declining due to the increased use of cellular telephones and the fee is often insufficient to cover the cost of these services, thereby requiring any difference to be paid for with property taxes;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Grant County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the Wisconsin Legislature and Governor to support legislation and state budget action that accomplishes all of the following goals:

 Fully funds the County and Municipal Aid Program (shared revenue) with state General Purpose Revenue, rather than the Police and Fire Protection Fee; and,

- Establishes a technology-neutral fee on all cell phones, landline phones, and other devices capable of dialing 911; and,
- Uses the revenue from this fee to fund a grant program to pay for equipment purchases and training for one Public Safety Answering Point (911 center) per county, as designated by the county board of each county, and to develop financial incentives to encourage consolidation of 911 services; and,
- Provides a sustainable source of funding for costs associated with providing all telephone lines (landline and cellular) into county Public Safety Answering Points.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to:

- The WCA Board of Directors for consideration at the WCA Annual Business Meeting.
- All other 71 Counties within the State of Wisconsin urging that all county officials support the resolution to restore the funding for this vital public safety service.
- The Governor of the State of Wisconsin and all Wisconsin State Legislators with a constituency within Grant County

The 2013-15 State Biennial Budget requires the Wisconsin court system to return a total of \$11.8 million to the state general fund over the next two-year period, resulting in budget cuts affecting the Dunn County circuit court system; and,

Iit is in the best interests of Dunn County to oppose this proposed budget reduction.

# SUPPORT OF A NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY IN WISCONSIN'S MID-LAKE MICHIGAN MARITIME TRAILS REGION (INCLUSIVE OF OZAUKEE COUNTY)

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Great Lakes contain some of the Nation's most important natural, cultural, and recreational resources; and

WHEREAS, Governor Walker has recognized that tourism is a key component of economic development; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Historical Society (WHS), in partnership with the Department of Administration's Wisconsin Coastal Management Program (WCMP), recommended that an 875 square-mile area within the 2,552 square-mile Mid-Lake Michigan region be considered for a national marine sanctuary in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the "Mid-Lake region" contains 33 known shipwrecks and holds the best examples of many vessels that sailed Wisconsin waters, including 14 intact shipwreck sites; the two oldest shipwrecks discovered to date, both of which remain intact; and 12 wrecks listed on the National Register of Historic Places; and

WHEREAS, the WHS, the WCMP, the University of Wisconsin Sea Grant Institute, and the citizens of the State have invested a quarter of a century in documenting, preserving, and celebrating Wisconsin's rich maritime heritage; and

WHEREAS, the WHS administers the Wisconsin Maritime Trails Initiative, which promotes tourism along Wisconsin's lakes and rivers linking maritime-themed websites, interpretive signage, kiosks, shipwreck mooring buoys, parks, historic waterfronts, lighthouses, museums, historical vessel and boat tours and excursions; and

WHEREAS, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) National Marine Sanctuary Program was established in 1972 under the Marine Protection, Research and Sanctuaries Act, and today the program serves as the trustee for a system of 14 marine protected areas encompassing more than 150,000 square miles of ocean and Great Lakes waters; and

WHEREAS, National Marine Sanctuaries are defined by the National Marine Sanctuaries Act (sec. 301) to be "areas of marine environment with special conservation, recreational, ecological, historical, cultural, archaeological, or aesthetic qualities"; and

WHEREAS, national marine sanctuaries draw regional, national and international tourism, impact regional and local economies, and are featured and promoted in countless magazines, journals, books, and films; and

WHEREAS, national marine sanctuaries support a wide variety of educational programs to share the history of Great Lakes shipwrecks with the public and promote science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM); and

WHEREAS, national marine sanctuaries protect nationally significant resources, such as Wisconsin's Great Lakes shipwrecks; and support research and documentation to better understand, protect, and interpret the well-preserved shipwrecks; and

WHEREAS, a national marine sanctuary in Wisconsin's Mid-Lake Michigan shore would leverage the investment made by the State and mid-Lake Michigan harbor towns to enhance tourism as a key component of economic development in the State and this region; and

WHEREAS, no state or local matching funds or on-going operational support are required in order to establish a national marine sanctuary; and

WHEREAS, local resources and infrastructure may be used in partnership with NOAA to complement and enhance a national marine sanctuary in the State; and

WHEREAS, NOAA re-activated the sanctuary nomination process, such that communities can submit nominations for an area to be considered as a national marine sanctuary;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ozaukee County Board supports the establishment of a national marine sanctuary along our Lake Michigan shoreline and hereby recommends the nomination of the Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Manitowoc Counties shoreline region to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's for their official sanctuary designation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Ozaukee County agrees to partner with our neighboring communities located within the Mid-Lake Region and hereby requests the Governor and local representatives in the Senate and Assembly to support the nomination of a national marine sanctuary on the western shores of Lake Michigan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Ozaukee County Board of Supervisors that the County Clerk shall forward a copy of this resolution to the County Boards of Sheboygan and Manitowoc Counties, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, and to Ozaukee County's Legislative Representatives.

It has come to our attention that Mike Koenig Construction Co. may be currently bidding and/or performing work on one or more of your current or upcoming projects. Please be informed the North Central States Regional Council of Carpenters has a labor dispute with Mike Koenig Construction Co. The nature of our dispute with the above referenced Contractor is over their failure to ensure that carpenter union area standard wages and benefits are paid to all of their employees on all of their projects.

North Central States Regional Council of Carpenters has made a solid commitment of personnel and resources to protect and preserve area standard wages, including providing or making payments for family health care and a dignified retirement for all area carpentry craft workers. Therefore, we are asking that you use your managerial discretion to not allow non-area standard contractors to perform any work on any of your projects unless and until they generally meet area labor standards for all their carpentry craft work.

We want you to be aware that our public information campaign against the above referenced Contractor unfortunately may impact some parties associated with projects where they are employed. That campaign involves the peaceful and lawful display of banners and distribution of handbills at the jobsite and premises of property owners, developers, and other firms involved with projects involving a non-area standard contractor. We will work cooperatively with all involved parties and will try to limit any impact on neutral entities or persons, but we cannot sit idly by while these entities condone and/support the non-area standards contractor.

If you agree to comply with the request we have made in this letter, or if our information about a non-area standard contractor being involved with any of your projects is incorrect, please call the undersigned immediately at 920-996-2336. Doing so will avoid any misunderstandings or mistakes.

Mr. Payne then presented the 2015 Proposed Sheboygan County Budget. The proposed 2015 budget increases the property tax levy by 1.22% or \$ 566,364, marking only the 4<sup>th</sup> increase in 8 years. The tax rate will increase 0.71%, or four cents. The modest increase is due to capturing additional revenue associated with net new construction, as allowed by the state law, in order to help maintain essential services such as law enforcement and our transportation system. Mr. Payne reviewed key components of the budget, and thanked the County Board, Department Heads and staff for their efforts and excellent teamwork.

## PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED BUDGET

Chairperson Te Stroete noted that the Notice of Public Hearing was published on October 9, 2014 and declared the public hearing on the proposed 2015 budget open for anyone wishing to be heard. The following persons addressed the board:

There being no other persons wishing to be heard, Chairperson Te Stroete declared the public hearing closed at 6:48 p.m.

The Chairperson announced that the next order of business would be the review of the 2015 Proposed Budget and directed the County Clerk to go through the budget on a department by department basis. As each department was identified, the Chairperson requested that any amendments be offered.

Supervisor Glavan made a motion to amend the Building Improvement (Capital Projects) Budget for Taylor Park shelter by increasing \$30,000 utilizing fund balance. Supervisor Van Dixhorn seconded the motion which carried on roll call vote of the board Ayes; 12, Noes: 11, Supervisors Bemis, Bosman, Conrardy, Damp, Goehring, LeMahieu, Marthenze, Ogea, Te Stroete, Weggeman, and Winkel; Absent: 2, Supervisors Bauer, and Otten.

When no further motions were offered, Chairperson Te Stroete declared the Budget Review Session concluded.

Supervisor Bemis made a motion to refer the budget back to the Finance Committee. Supervisor LeMahieu seconded the motion which carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board.

The 2015 Proposed Budget, as modified by the floor motions, was referred back to the Finance Committee.

## **ADJOURNMENT**

Supervisor Bemis made a motion to adjourn to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 4, 2014. Supervisor Winkel seconded the motion which carried on unanimous roll call vote of the board. The meeting was adjourned at 7:18 p.m.

# SHEBOYGAN COUNTY CONTRACT FOR LEGAL SERVICES AS CORPORATION COUNSEL

This Agreement is entered into between SHEBOYGAN COUNTY ("COUNTY"), 508 New York Avenue, Sheboygan, Wisconsin, by its duly authorized Human Resources CommitteeCounty Administrator, and HOPP NEUMANN HUMKE LLP ("FIRM"), 2124 Kohler Memorial Drive — Suite 110, Sheboygan, Wisconsin 53081-3174, by its duly authorized partner Attorney Carl K. Buesing ("BUESING"). In consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, it is agreed as follows:

- 1. PURPOSE AND INTENT. COUNTY acting through its County Board of Supervisors ("BOARD") will consider a recommendation to authorize its Human Resources Committeehas adopted Resolution No. \_\_\_\_ (2014/15) and has directed the County Administrator to enter into a contract with FIRM to provide legal services as its designated Corporation Counsel. FIRM is willing to provide such services under the terms of this Agreement.
- SCOPE OF SERVICES. FIRM agrees to provide the legal services as set forth herein to COUNTY. The services to be provided by FIRM shall be those established by the present course of dealing between the parties and which are summarized in Section 42.04 of the County Code together with such duties as are required by the County Administrator and any other County Department Head, including providing administrative professional oversight of the Child Support Attorney/Assistant Corporation Counsel unless otherwise relieved thereof by the Human Resources Committee and the County Administrator. In addition thereto, FIRM agrees on a temporary or emergency basis to provide without additional compensation back-up legal services for the Child Support Attorney/Assistant Corporation Counsel for child support and Chapter 51/88054/55 matters. The parties recognize that the hours of professional and staff services necessary for FIRM to properly discharge its duties will vary from month to month and year to year, and FIRM agrees to continue to provide the present scope of services for the fixed charge agreed upon below regardless of the hours that may be necessary to discharge such duties. FIRM has delegated Attorney Carl K. Buesing to be the principal contact for COUNTY and to represent COUNTY as its designated Corporation Counsel and has agreed that its other professionals will provide and supplement BUESING's legal services as may be required from time to time as COUNTY needs. In the event of the disability of BUESING or his retirement or severance from FIRM, FIRM agrees upon consultation with COUNTY's Human Resources Committee the County Administrator to develop a transition plan to appoint one of its partners to act in the formal capacity of as the designated Corporation Counsel on behalf of FIRM.
  - A. FIRM's Role. The attorneys in FIRM may concentrate their work efforts in limited areas of the law. When experienced resources within FIRM are available, BUESING and the County Administrator may request other attorneys to handle certain aspects of COUNTY's matters. Such attorneys may be referred to as Assistant Corporation Counsel when so acting but shall not be deemed to be employees of COUNTY as a result of such designation. Until changed with COUNTY's consent, it will be BUESING's responsibility to coordinate the work FIRM is doing for COUNTY.
  - B. FIRM's Commitment. Consistent with the Wisconsin Code of Professional Responsibility for licensed attorneys, FIRM will do all it can to serve COUNTY effectively. FIRM will act with reasonable diligence and promptness when

undertaking work on behalf of COUNTY and will proceed in taking such lawful and ethical measures as may be necessary to carry out COUNTY's causes or endeavors. The involved professionals or staff assistants of FIRM will keep COUNTY's representatives reasonably informed about the status of matters under their control and will promptly respond to appropriate requests for information so that COUNTY can make informed decisions as the circumstances may require.

- C. <u>Conflicts of Interest</u>. In keeping with FIRM's ethical obligation, FIRM will promptly identify any conflict of interest situation to all parties and FIRM will withdraw from any further involvement. For its part, COUNTY will continue to maintain funding in the Corporation Counsel Department budget to address conflict situations. The County Administrator is authorized to approve conflict waivers on behalf of County as appropriate.
- D. FIRM's Professional Standard. In representing COUNTY, FIRM's professional staff shall utilize its technical training and experience and its independent professional judgment to render candid legal advice. In rendering advice, the lawyers may refer not only to law but also to moral, economic, social, and political factors that may be relevant to COUNTY's decisions. Legislative determinations, however, are in the exclusive domain of BOARD, and FIRM's lawyers shall respect the distinction between FIRM's role as advisor and COUNTY's role as elected policy makers.
- E. Change in Scope of Services. Any substantial change in FIRM's hours resulting from additional duties assigned to FIRM may be the basis for FIRM requesting additional compensation. Additional duties that may trigger this provision include, by way of illustration, legislative changes that assign additional duties to the Corporation Counsel. COUNTY, through its Human Resources Committee and approved by its Finance Committee, may but is not required to agree to such additional compensation. If FIRM is dissatisfied with COUNTY's response to a request for additional compensation, FIRM's remedy shall be to exercise early termination of this Agreement pursuant to Paragraph 4.B., below. In the event COUNTY no longer owns or operates its current nursing home facilities and FIRM's duties are significantly diminished as a consequence, the parties agree to review the fixed charge agreed upon below.
- F. <u>Elimination of Certain Services</u>. FIRM shall not be required to engage in the following activities which had been part of its duties prior to October 1, 2003:
- i. Preparation and circulation of agenda for monthly meeting of Human Resources Committee with Corporation Counsel.
- ii. Preparation and circulation of minutes of monthly meeting of Human Resources Committee with Corporation Counsel.

To the extent that such services are required, they shall be performed through the use of Human Resources Department staff.

3. <u>TERM.</u> The term of this Agreement is four (4) years commencing January 1, 20142015, and ending on December 31, 20142018, subject to the rights of the parties to terminate the contract before its expiration as set forth elsewhere in this Agreement.

- 4. <u>EARLY TERMINATION</u>. This contract may be terminated before December 31, 20142018, as follows:
  - A. COUNTY may by majority vote of BOARD terminate this Agreement at any time with or without cause.
  - B. FIRM may terminate this Agreement if it determines that it no longer has the professional and/or support staffing necessary to adequately provide at present levels the above legal services to COUNTY provided that FIRM may not exercise this withdrawal option upon less than one hundred twenty (120) days' advance notice to COUNTY (unless COUNTY agrees to accept shorter notice) and further provided that FIRM shall provide all necessary assistance for transition of pending matters and closed files to successor counsel.
- 5. EXTENSION. The parties may but are not required to negotiate to extend this contract beyond its expiration date. Such extension shall fully comply with the rules and ordinances of BOARD then in effect.
- 6. <u>COMPENSATION</u>. The compensation to be paid to **FIRM** for its services shall be paid in equal monthly installments upon approval by **COUNTY** of vouchers submitted in the format required by **COUNTY** and shall be as follows:

Calendar 20112014: \$195,815.92\$207,855.00 annually; \$16,317.99\$17,321.25 monthly, plus an annual increase equal to any increase given by the County Board to non-bargaining employees on an across-the-board basis for 20112015 pursuant to Section 47.18(a) of the Sheboygan County Code.

<u>Calendar</u> <u>20122016</u>: The compensation paid in <u>20142015</u>, plus an annual increase equal to any increase given by the County Board to non-bargaining employees on an across-the-board basis for <u>20122016</u> pursuant to Section 47.18(a) of the Sheboygan County Code.

Calendar 20132017: The compensation paid in 20122016, plus an annual increase equal to any increase given by the County Board to non-bargaining employees on an across-the-board basis for 20132017 pursuant to Section 47.18(a) of the Sheboygan County Code, except no increase shall be greater than two percent (2%) over the previous year's compensation.

Calendar 20142018: The compensation paid in 20132017, plus an annual increase equal to any increase given by the County Board to non-bargaining employees on an across-the-board basis for 20142018 pursuant to Section 47.18(a) of the Sheboygan County Code, except no increase shall be greater than two percent (2%) over the previous year's compensation.

The amounts stated above include allowances for such expenses as office support staff, library, and printing that in the past were billed separately by FIRM to COUNTY. FIRM reserves the right to discontinue some library subscription services when in the discretion of FIRM such subscriptions no longer benefit COUNTY. FIRM shall be reimbursed from COUNTY for other expenses such as court reporters' transcript charges, court filing fees, Laredo document printing charges for County business, and outside charges for process service in accordance with past practice provided that such charges shall continue to be reviewed and approved by COUNTY's Human Resources Committee.

- 7. ACCOUNTABILITY. In order to provide accountability to COUNTY, FIRM agrees to:
  - A. Provide to the Human Resources Committee and County Administrator a monthly and cumulative time spent by individual attorneys broken down by Department;
  - B. Provide to the Human Resources Committee, Department Heads, and County Administrator with a schedule of attorney availability, a listing of vacations and other times off for BUESING, and arrangements for back-up legal services in BUESING's absence.
  - C. Such reporting and review with the County Administrator as the firm and the County Administrator agree is appropriate.
- 8. RELATED SERVICES. In the performance of the duties provided under this Agreement, FIRM occasionally encounters circumstances which require clarification. Some of Tthese circumstances are outlined as follows:
  - A. <u>Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Company</u>. COUNTY utilizes Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Company as its primary liability insurance provider. COUNTY has no objection to FIRM being hired by Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Company to defend claims on behalf of Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Company and COUNTY provided there are no coverage issues.
  - B. Prairie States. COUNTY has utilizesd Prairie States as its primary health plan administrator. COUNTY has no objection to FIRM being hired by Prairie States to handle subrogation matters on behalf of Prairie States and COUNTY and will request that Prairie States utilize FIRM as its primary counsel for COUNTY subrogation matters.
  - C. Assistant Corporation Counsel Duties. FIRM agrees, pursuant to Paragraph 2, to provide emergency back-up legal services to the Assistant Corporation Counsel. In the event long-term back-up is required, FIRM may provide such back-up services at a charge to COUNTY similar to the charge that other private attorneys charge for similar services.
  - D. <u>Land Information Subscriber Contract</u>. COUNTY shall provide FIRM with a Land Information Subscriber Contract or County login status the value of which is Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per year which FIRM does not presently have. FIRM may use the Land Information Subscriber Contract for its private clients as well as for County business.
  - E. LAREDO Subscriber Contract. COUNTY shall provide FIRM with a LAREDO access through the Register of Deeds' office without charge to FIRM, the value of which is Four Hundred Dellars (\$400.00) per month which FIRM is presently paying. FIRM may use the LAREDO-contract-for its private clients as well as for County business.
  - FE. Revolving Loan Fund. COUNTY agrees that FIRM may charge time at FIRM's regular hourly rate to COUNTY for services it provides to COUNTY's revolving loan fund for preparing the paperwork for loans actually approved to

borrowers for each file **FIRM** works on provided **FIRM**'s invoices are otherwise approved by the Revolving Loan Committee and the Executive Committee and provided that the invoices are paid out of the County's Revolving Loan Fund itself as an administrative expense and not from general property tax revenues. To the extent that **FIRM** provides services to the Revolving Loan Fund beyond services compensated above, nothing contained herein shall be interpreted to relieve or diminish **FIRM**'s role or responsibility to provide such services, and **FIRM** shall continue to charge its time against the Revolving Loan Fund account for reimbursement to the Corporation Counsel account.

- 9. PRIVATE PRACTICE. Section 42.06 of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances allowing the person appointed as Corporation Counsel to engage in the private practice of the law is reaffirmed. However, no person appointed as Corporation Counsel nor any member of that person's law firm may be retained privately by any member of the County Board without the prior approval of the Human Resources CommitteeCounty Administrator.
- 10. <u>BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENTADDENDUM</u>. This Agreement is supplemented by a Business Associate AgreementAddendum to assure Sheboygan County's continued compliance with HIPAA.

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## SHEBOYGAN COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. <u>07</u> (2014/15)

Re: Incorporating Child Support Agency into Health and Human Services
Department

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 59.53(5) requires that each county establish a child support agency, but it does not require that the child support agency must be a stand-alone entity, and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. §§ 46.22(1)(c) and 46.23(3)(b) provide that county boards may transfer to the county health and human services department such other powers and duties, including other departments, to the jurisdiction of the health and human services department, if appropriate, and

WHEREAS, based on an assessment by the Sheboygan County Health and Human Services Department, a copy of which is on file with the Clerk, opportunities made available to the County as a consequence of Act 10 and in conjunction with an impending retirement, Sheboygan County is able to restructure the manner in which it provides child and spousal support, paternity establishment, and enforcement services so as to take advantage of the similar resources and mission of the Health and Human Services Department through a consolidation of the Child Support Agency as a component part of the Health and Human Services Department;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Sheboygan does ordain as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Amending Section 2.12(3)(b)</u>. Section 2.12(3)(b) of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows (additions indicated by redlining):
  - (3)(b) To serve as liaison for the Health and Human Services Department, including administration of child support services as required pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.53(5), and the Veterans' Service Office and in that capacity to confer with them from time to time concerning the operation of their offices.
- Section 2. <u>Amending Section 2.12(6)(a)</u>. Section 2.12(6)(a) of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows (deletions indicated by strikeouts):
  - (6)(a) To serve as liaison between the Sheriff, Clerk of Courts, Child Support-Enforcement Agency, District Attorney, Coroner, and Circuit Court Commissioner and in that capacity to confer with them from time to time concerning the operation of their offices and Departments.
- Section 3. Incorporating Child Support Agency into Health and Human Services Department. Chapter 10 of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances is amended as follows (additions indicated by redlining, deletions by strikeouts; only those portions affected appear):
- 10.02 PURPOSE. The purpose of the Department is to develop a comprehensive range of human services which shall include health care, public health

services, mental illness treatment, developmental disabilities services, general relief, income maintenance, probation and parole services, alcohol and drug abuse services, services to children, youth and aging, family counseling, exceptional educational services and manpower services. Its programs responsibilities shall include providing community services and facilities for the prevention and amelioration of social, mental, and physical disabilities.

It is intended that this Department shall exercise the powers and duties of a County Department of Developmental Disabilities under Wis. Stat. § 51.437, a County Department of Social Services under Wis. Stat. § 46.22, a County Department of Community Programs under Wis. Stat. § 51.42, a Board of Health under Wis. Stat. § 250.01(4)(a), and a Child Support Enforcement Agency under Wis. Stat. § 59.53(5).

- 10.03 HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE. The Health and Human Services Department shall be administered by a Human Services Committee composed of nine (9) persons of recognized ability and demonstrated interest in human services. Six (6) members shall be County Board of Supervisors and three (3) members shall be consumers of services or citizens at large. A good faith effort shall be made to appoint a registered nurse and a physician to the Committee. SuchCounty Board members shall be appointed by the Executive Committee and confirmed by the County Board of Supervisors. Citizen members shall be approved by the County Administrator and confirmed by the County Board of Supervisors.
- 10.04 TERM OF OFFICE. The term of office of any citizen member of the Committee shall be three (3) years but of the members first appointed, at least 1/3 shall be appointed for one (1) year; 1/3 for two (2) years and the remainder for three (3) years, all with an April term ending date to coincide with the County Board's Organizational meetings; the staggered terms to be indicated at the time of appointment. County Board Supervisors' terms, however, shall terminate upon their failure to hold such officethe end of the County Board legislative session.
- 10.06 REMOVAL. A County Supervisor Health and Human Services Committee member may be removed from office for cause by a 2/3 vote of the County Board of Supervisors—participating—in—the—appointment, on due notice in writing and hearing of the charges against the member. A citizen member may be removed by the County Administrator for cause.
- 10.07 DUTIES. The County Health and Human Services Committee: shall exercise the powers and duties as provided at Wis. Stat. § 46.23(5m).
  - (a) Shall-determine administrative and program policies within limits established by the Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services (the "DEPARTMENT"). Policy decisions not reserved by statute for the Department may be delegated by its Secretary to the County Health and Human Services Committee.

- (b) Shall establish priorities in addition to those mandated by the Department.
- (c) Shall determine whether state mandated services are provided or purchased or contracted for with local providers, and monitor the performance of such contracts. Purchase of services contracts shall be subject to the conditions specified in sec. 46.036, Stats.
- (d) Shall determine, subject to the budgetary approval of the County Board of Supervisors and with the advice of the County Health and Human Services Director whether services are to be previded directly by the County Department of Health and Human Services or contracted for with other providers and make such contracts. The County Board of Supervisors may at any time elect to require the approval of any such contract by the County Board of Supervisors.
- (e) Shall represent human service agencies, professionals and consumers of services in negotiations with the state and federal governments.
- (f) Shall appoint a County Health and Human Services Director on the basis of recognized and demonstrated interest in and knowledge of human services problems, with due regard to training, experience, executive and administrative ability and general qualification and fitness for the performance of the duties of the County Health and Human Services Director. The appointment shall be subject to the personnel policies and procedures established from time to time by the County Board.
- (g) Shall appoint advisory committees for the purpose of receiving community, professional or technical information concerning particular policy considerations. Members of Advisory Committees shall serve without compensation except that they shall be entitled to out of pocket costs and reimbursement for meals and mileage, all as in accordance with Chapter 45 of the Sheboygan County Code of Ordinances.
- (h) Shall determine the number and location of any outstations when appropriate to meet service demands.
- (i) May recommend the removal of the County Health and Human Services Director for cause to the County Board and the County Board may remove the County Health and Human Services Director for cause by a 2/3 vote, on due notice in writing and hearing of the charges against the County Health and Human Services Director.
- Shall develop County Health and Human Services Committee organization and operating procedures.
- (k) Shall oversee the operation of one or more service delivery programs.

- (I) Shall evaluate services delivery.
- (m) May perform such other general functions necessary to administer its programs authorized herein.
- (n) Shall submit a proposed budget in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 46.031(I) for authorized services. Notwithstanding the categorization of or limits specified for funds allocated under Wis. Stat. §§ 49.51(I)(d) or 51.423(2) with the approval of the Department of Health and Social Services, the County Health and Human Services Committee may expend these funds consistent with any service provided under Wis. Stat. §§ 49.52(I)(d) or 51.42.
- (o) Shall-cooperate to the extent feasible with the school-board, health planning agencies, law enforcement agencies, and other human service agencies, committees and planning bodies in Sheboygan County.
- (p) Shall comply with State requirements.
- (q) Shall-have charge of operations and space utilization for the building known as the Health and Human Services Building.
- (r) Shall-carry-out-such other duties as may from time to time be delegated to it by the County Board of Supervisors.
- 10.08 PROGRAMHEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES DIRECTOR. The County Health and Human Services Director appointed under Section 10.07(6) of this Code shall: Wis. Stat. § 46.23(6m) by the County Administrator shall have the powers and duties as set forth under Wis. Stat. § 46.23(6m). In addition thereto, the County Health and Human Services Director shall supervise the Child Support Enforcement Agency programs required under Wis. Stat. § 59.53(5).
  - (a) Have all of the administrative and executive powers and duties of managing, operating, maintaining and improving the programs of the County Health and Fluman Services Department, subject to the rules promulgated by the Department of Health and Social Services under Wisconsin law. In consultation with the County Health and Human Services Board and subject to its approval, the County Health and Human Services Director shall prepare:
    - (1) An annual comprehensive plan and budget of all funds necessary for the program and services authorized by this section in which priorities and objectives for the year are established as well as any modifications of long-range objectives.
    - Intermediate range plans and budget.

WHEREAS, the fourth component is the Sheboygan County portion of the Eastern Shores Library System approved for the budget and an apportionment adjustment for the Eastern Shores Library System and required by Wis. No County official or employee shall use or permit the use of County buildings or property for personal convenience or profit or by third parties except to the extent such third-party use is determined to be ancillary in purpose to County government and approved by the Property Committee or the County Administrator
  - Section 2. Effective Date. The herein Ordinance shall take effect upon enactment.
